Duke Charles. The duke's representative in Zealand was Sir Claude de Rhynault, a ruthless libertine, bent on serving the duke and also himself by punishing all who opposed him in any way whatsoever.

One of the chief citizens of Middleburg, complicated in the insurrection plots is Philip Danyelt, and while apprehending the husband, Rhynault meets Johanna, and desires her. Nothing must interfere with his wishes, and Danyelt's stupid head is to be sacrificed unless Johanna will accept the powerful governor's unwelcome advances. Of course Duke Anthony appears on the scene in time, and Rhynault, too, pays the price of his treachery, presumption, and cruelty, while Anthony realizes that a burglar's widow will make a beautiful duchess as well as a much loved wife. The Romantic Prince, as in other of Mr. Sabatini's novels, radiates atmosphere, in the suggestion of which this author is unusually clever. His historic backgrounds also are picturesque and convincing.

## Tribute To Sir Edward Kemp

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Aug. 14.—Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative Leader, paid tribute here to Sir Edward Kemp, who died on Monday. "The death of Sir Edward Kemp," Mr. Bennett declared, "removes from our midst an outstanding Canadian whose life was a striking example of

what a youth of ability, integrity, courage, ambition and faith in his country can achieve. Through his own efforts he became one of our great captains of industry. He accumulated a vast fortune which he used freely for every cause that appealed to his sympathies, but he will be best remembered by a grateful people as a distinguished public servant who served the Dominion in both Houses of Parliament and, when the life of the country was threatened by a world war, his wide experience, business capacity, wise counsel and administrative ability enabled him to discharge enormous duties with credit and distinction alike to himself and the Canadian people. He will be greatly missed, not only in the Senate, in his home city and by his former political associates but by a large circle of friends."

Sir George Perley, member for Argenteuil, who arrived here last night with Mr. Bennett and members of his party on a speaking tour of British Columbia, joined in paying tribute to the late Sir Edward Kemp. "I am much shocked," Sir George stated, "to hear of the death of my old friend Sir Edward Kemp." "We entered Sir Robert Borden's Government in 1911 and all of us soon learned to value highly his sound judgment and gift for capable administration. His passing is a great loss to the public life of Canada and my wife and I sympathize sincerely with his widow and his family in their heavy bereavement."

## TOURISTS GRANTED GREATER PRIVILEGES

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 13.—Collectors of national revenue have been invested with an authority previously held exclusively by the officials at Ottawa, whereby the local collectors may now authorize the use for health or pleasure of automobiles brought into Canada under Travellers' Vehicle Permits.

It also is provided in the order issued by the Commissioner of Customs to the collectors that Travellers' Vehicle Permits may now be issued without bond or deposit—an important concession, as a charge of \$10.00 was usually made by the customs brokers providing the bond formerly required.

Under the Travellers' Vehicle Permit, a non-resident of Canada is permitted to use his motor vehicle in reaching his destination in Canada, even though entering Canada for business purposes. The non-resident may now, in addition, use his motor car after reaching his destination, for purposes of health and pleasure, but is still precluded from using car for strictly business purposes.

The Department of National Revenue has ruled that driving between points in Canada, attending meetings or conferences or examining properties or industrial plants are not considered to be violations of the privilege of a Travellers' Vehicle Permit, properly endorsed by the local collector of customs, but such privileges do not include the right to transport goods, or carry passengers, between points in Canada for purposes of gain or hire, nor the use of the vehicle for any purpose by any person other than the permit holder, or by persons who are using the vehicle for selling goods or insurance or engaging in commercial pursuits in competition with residents of Canada.

There is an important distinction between permits for Tourists' Automobiles and permits for Travellers' Vehicles. The Tourist's Permit is good for a period of sixty days, renewable for further period of thirty days without bond or deposit. The Traveller's Vehicle Permit is good only for thirty days under the regulations at present in effect.

## GOVT. CONTROL OF BROADCASTING NOT FAVORED

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—Unrestricted competitive commercial broadcasting with a definite trend to Dominion-wide, hook-ups, with short interval programmes of the highest quality, but essentially an advertising medium, is expected to be the direct outcome of the report of the Royal Commission on Radio Broadcasting which will make its report to the Government shortly. Information obtained from an authoritative source here indicates that Sir John Aird and his fellow Commissioners will recommend government control of broadcasting.

## YACHT FOR MUSSOLINI

MUGLIANO, Italy, Aug. 13.—After an adventuresome career under many flags, the yacht "Aurora," alias half-a-dozen other names, will soon be completely refitted for use as the personal yacht of Premier Mussolini. When the yacht is finished it will be one of the most luxurious in the world. Among its furnishings will be some world-famous paintings given by various galleries of Italy. It will

carry two small cannon with which to return salutes of salutes. The "Aurora" was born under an English flag and christened the "Nirvana." The Australian government—before the war—acquired possession of her and named her "Taurus." The yacht was sent to Constantinople, when the seat of the Turkish government was there, and placed at the disposal of the Australian Ambassador to Turkey.

During the war Italy seized the yacht and gave it the name of "Marechiaro." After the war the "Marechiaro" was turned over to the navy department and practically passed out of notice for ten years.

When Premier Mussolini, however, expressed a desire to be able to make short trips without calling for a ship of war, naval officers thought of the "Marechiaro." Now after many years the yacht is entering the proudest months of her career. It is possible the Premier may make use of her this summer.
