LATE BLIGHT—Dominion Laboratories of Plant Pathology and Entomology, Charlottetown, P. E. I., has issued the following Bulletin. The incidence of late blight in Prince Edward Island has remained nearly constant during the past week and only one new case has been discovered. However, the wet weather of Monday and Tuesday has stimulated the disease in the fields where it is present and the production of spores in most of these fields has been abundant. High in some localities, DDT should be applied about every ten days for the remainder of the growing season. Use either 2 lbs. of 50% wettable powder to 100 gallons or if you prefer an emulsion use 1 quart of 25% to 400 gallons of spray. Smaller amounts of DDT will not give satisfactory control of potato insects in Prince Edward Island.
