Dail President Says Situation Improves Daily

DUBLIN, Oct. 23.—Richard Mulcahy, minister of defence, refused in the Dail Eireann today an appeal made to him by George Gavin Duffy for assurance that Irish prisoners would not be deported to St. Helena or some other place where the British Navy would be required to prevent their escape. Mr. Mulcahy refused also to name the place of deportation. William Cosgrave, president of the Dail Eireann, described the Irish military situation as "well in hand and improving daily." "I have no doubt whatever as to the ultimate result," he declared. "All that is wanted is for the people to forget there is any interruption of normal conditions and get back to work."

Murder Mystery Is Still Unsolved

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. Oct. 23.—"Something new"—evidence, the nature of which the small army of newspaper men working on the Hall-Mills murder case have not even guessed at—is in the hands of the authorities investigating the double slaying it was declared today by a man close in the confidence of County Prosecutors Beekman, of Somerset, and Striker of Middlesex. The question was given color by continuation of the feverish activity of the past three days on the part of detectives and others on the case. Another angle on which the detectives worked today was the story of Alfred Butler, a taxicab driver, that on the morning the bodies were found, he had driven a passenger to the Hall home and had seen a green automobile standing in front of the house. Edward Carpenter, a cousin of Mrs. Hall, he said emerged with a desk drawer, filled with papers and letters and drove away. Carpenter told newspapermen this morning he had been at the house in his green car, but declared the only thing he had taken away were the minister's vestments, which he said he took to the church. The question of whether Mr. Hall was buried in the vestments concerning which Carpenter and Mrs. Clarke spoke, appears to be a moot one.

ARMENIANS NOT LIKELY TO COME IN LARGE NUMBERS

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—Settlement of Armenian refugees in Canada has been given consideration, but no new regulations, it is stated at the immigration department, are at present in prospect to facilitate their admission. While such settlement is receiving support on humanitarian grounds, the difficulty of occupation has arisen. Armenians who have so far come to Canada, it is stated, are mainly city dwellers.

CABINET CRISIS IN BRITAIN TO DELAY REFUNDING DEBT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Resignation of the British Cabinet today is expected here to delay the opening of negotiations looking to the refunding of the \$4,750,000,000 British war debt to the United States. It is not expected, however, that it will affect interest payments on the debt, due this month.

Gnaws Rope And Saves Herself And Husband

DETROIT, Oct. 23.—Mrs. Delma R. McDaniel saved her own life and that of her husband, Monday night by parting with her teeth a rope that held fast to its anchor their capsized canoe. When the canoe floated free they clung to it while it drifted towards shore. Their cries were heard and rescue reached them in time. The pair had made the canoe fast with an anchor while they were fishing in Lake St. Clair. McDaniel, leaning too far out on one side, caused the craft to capsize. He tried in vain to untie the rope, while he and his wife clung to the canoe in the icy water. When his efforts failed, his wife began to gnaw at the rope. Finally she bit through it and the overturned craft acted as a buoy to which they clung. They were a mile from shore. Each clung to the canoe with one hand and paddled with the other. Little by little the canoe was forced towards the Canadian shore, and at last their cries were heard. James Green, who works at the Beach Grove Country Club, put out in a rowboat, took in the numb and exhausted pair and hurried them to the club house, where they were revived.

WESTERN FARMERS TO GET CHANCE TO MOVE FROM BARREN AREAS

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 23.—Legislation will be brought down at the next session of the Federal parliament regarding a proposal for granting extra homesteads to those farmers who have been unable, on account of continued drought conditions or other reasons for which they are not themselves responsible, to make good, according to Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, who arrived here today. In case it is decided to grant the extra homestead, Mr. Stewart said, the provincial authorities will be given the responsibility of stating who should be given the opportunity of moving. The legislation will be aimed at alleviating conditions in Southern Alberta, where farmers in the drought area would be assisted to get on lands in the North, where they could make a living.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. LAWRENCE BYRNE.

A deep gloom of sorrow spread over Byrne's Road when it became known that Mrs. Lawrence Byrne had passed to her eternal reward. The sad event occurred Sunday night, September 17th. Deceased had been feeling quite well and was attending to her household duties when she was stricken down with a paralytic stroke and after a short illness of 16 days passed away at the age of 67 years.

During her last illness she was frequently visited by her pastor, The Rev. Father Rooney and she died fortified by the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church. Higgins and Mrs. Shields in Boston; two sisters Mrs. Theresa O'Brien Windon and Mrs. John Clarkin, Byrne's Road; and one brother, Michael Connolly, Portland; are left to mourn. May her Soul rest in peace.

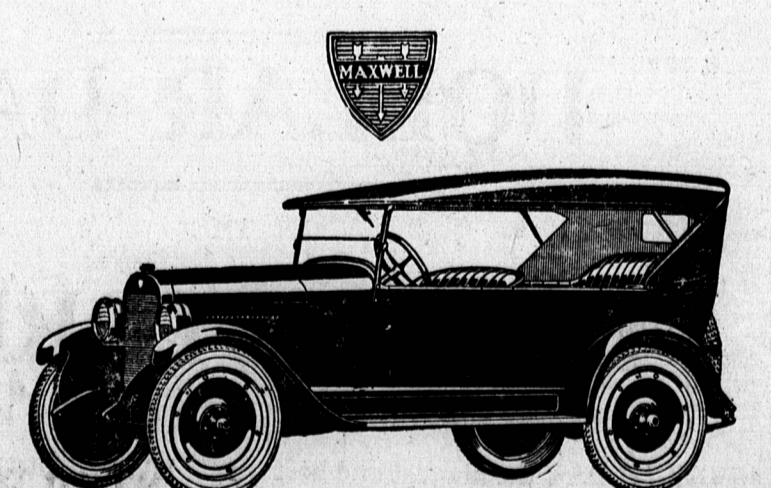

LUMBER AND FLOUR MEN RESENT INSINUATIONS

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—Lumber and flour interests throughout Canada are up in arms at the insinuations made by the management of the British Empire Exhibition that they cannot get Canadian lumber sufficiently good for the erection of fences around the exhibition at Dembley and for other lumber work and that the Canadian flour is not available for making bread. It is likely that a special meeting of the council of the Montreal board of trade will be called to consider the affront which, it is claimed, has been given to Canadian industries. A meeting of the lumber section of the board of trade will be held tomorrow to consider what steps shall be taken by the trade. There was nothing unusual in the suit except its cost as measured in kronen. In quality it was an ordinary grey suit, despite its cost.

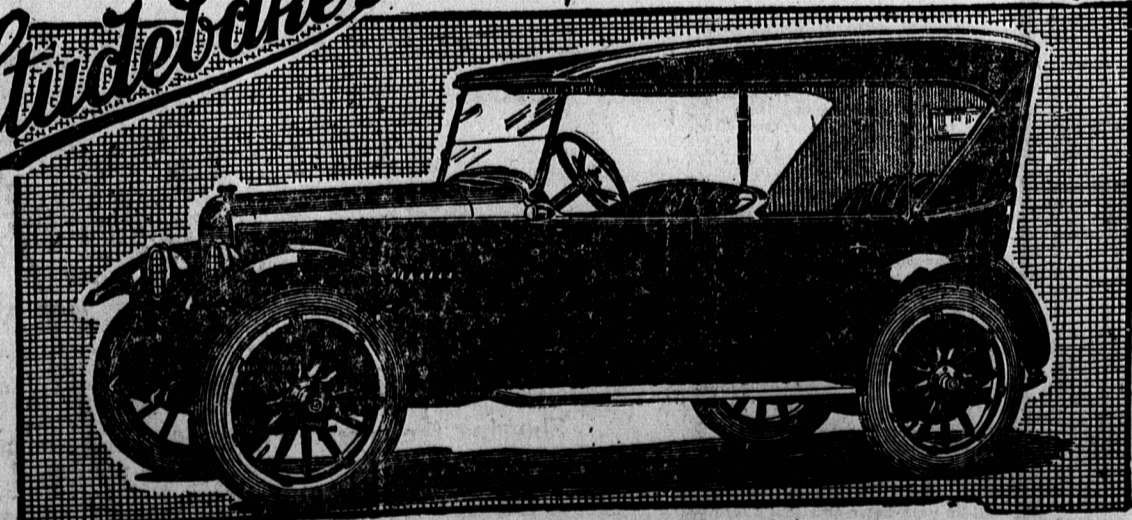
