Half Business

Section Of North Sydney In Ruins

Damage Said Between \$250,000 And \$500,000 In Five-Hour Blaze.

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 18 (CP)—This town of 7,000 people tonight surveyed its ruined business section and counted up the cost of early-morning fire that caused damage estimated between \$250,000 and \$500,000.

Half the business section was in ruins before the blaze, described as the second worst in the community's history, which broke out in the Owl Drug Store about 2 o'clock a.m. and rapidly levelled five other business establishments, including the Rivolt Theatre.

The fire also threatened the drug store about 10 o'clock last night, but had apparently been brought under control by firemen.

Breaking out again a few hours later, it levelled the drugstore, the theatre, Shebil's shoe repair shop, Thompson and Sutherland, across the street as well as the Albert Hotel and several other buildings.

Two men were injured fighting the blaze. Fire Chief Billy Parsons, boxing champion who fractured his collar bone in a fall from a ladder, and manager Art White of the Rivolt Theatre.

(By The Canadian Press) QUEBEC, Oct. 18—Soviet Russia will sign the constitution and receive full membership in the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization but nobody at the A.O. conference here seems to know when.

Vassil Sergeev, head of the large Russian delegation, replied "certainly yes," when asked by the Canadian Press if he would sign. But he said he did not know when.

The language question was settled this afternoon when a report of the general committee was adopted unanimously recommending that the F. A. O. follow whatever language procedure is adopted by the United Nations organization.

N. S. Man Is Acquitted On Murder Charge

PICTOU, N.S., Oct. 18 (CP)—After deliberating more than 12 hours, a petit jury today acquitted Maj. Murdoch E. Sutherland who had been charged with the murder of Angus D. MacPherson at Sialkton, N.S., June 6.

The trial opened yesterday before Mr. Justice Graham, and six witnesses gave evidence. Sutherland stood in his own defence, the accused stated that he had lived in MacLeod's Hotel, where the shooting took place, since September, 1934. He said that MacPherson was there then, and that he had been in the room after MacPherson had been a while, but returned in April of this year. Again he assumed misstatement of the accused, asking him for money and threatening physical violence.

Sutherland claimed that he did not strike MacPherson the night of the argument, but had thrown a salt shaker at him. MacPherson knocked him down and then Sutherland drew his revolver. MacPherson backed through the dining room door towards the hotel kitchen.

Another hotel tenant, Mrs. Besse Reid, had closed the door but MacPherson threw it open and shouted, "Here I come." Sutherland testified he then pulled the trigger, and MacPherson staggered backwards and collapsed.

"I was afraid of him," said Sutherland when cross-examined. The gun had been loaded a month or more before the shooting, Sutherland stated, and he had taken it away with him on the night of the shooting for protection against MacPherson's threats.

Argentine Workers Celebrate Return Of 4,000 Servicemen

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 18 (CP)—Buenos Aires economic and industrial life was paralyzed today by a 24-hour strike of workers celebrating the return to power of Colonel Justo.

The work stoppage appeared to be 96 per cent effective all over the city. The only exception was the street cleaning service.

Light, water and telephone service were not affected, but there were no deliveries of milk or meat in the city.

In the centre of Buenos Aires, posters hailing Peron as "the next president" appeared on shop windows and subway entrances.

The Government, meanwhile, announced the membership of the new cabinet, promised by President Peron after he had conferred with Peron following the latter's release from custody Wednesday night.

The cabinet included: Juan I. Cook, foreign minister; Col. Amaro Avalos, agriculture minister and acting finance minister; Gen. Juan Pietrini, public justice and education; Gen. Eusebio Soza Molina, war; Rear Adm. "Bebudo" Pantano, navy; and Lt. Col. Domingo Meronzi, secretary of labor and social welfare.

All except Peron served previously with Peron.

Conference Spotlight

QUEBEC, Oct. 18 (CP)—Two young men, one 26 and the other 42, both bearing scars suffered in fighting in defence of their personal beliefs and both of lowly origin, shared the spotlight of interest at the Quebec Food and Agriculture Organization conference.

They were M. Tangy Prigent, Minister of Agriculture in the French provisional government, and Vassil Sergeev, commissar for Foreign Trade in the Soviet Government. Both headed their respective delegations to the 26-year-old and looking nearer 26, short, fresh faced with heavy black pompadour, was a peasant boy forced to leave school at the age of 12.

He educated himself by studying at night on his 20-acre farm and by the time war broke out was deputy for Minister and had been mayor and alderman of his native St. Jean du Dolme since 1925.

He served with the French Army, was wounded, retreated to Vichy, voted against Petain and was twice arrested by the Gestapo but escaped and served two years as organizer and liaison officer with the resistance movement. At the time of invasion he was actively serving in the field with the Maquis. In September, 1944, General Charles de Gaulle, provisional president, made him Minister of Agriculture.

Mr. Prigent is socialist candidate in Minister for the general election starting Sunday. Gen. de Gaulle gave him his own private plane to fly to the Quebec conference, sign the constitution of the new government and return to close his campaign with two political meetings. His schedule called for an absence from France of only six days.

Vassil Sergeev is well-known in Canada and the United States. He is 42 and looks much older. Although scarcely in his teens he fought in the revolution and suffered many wounds.

Mr. Prigent's representative on the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration council since its inception he has attended conferences in Montreal, Atlantic City and London and is always a popular international figure.

Short, stocky, with thinning fair hair, Sergeev is intensely secretive and serious about international affairs but is a convivial companion and was once a great sportsman.

At the conference two tall shoulders and towering over him at receptions and public gatherings were mischievous and under-estimated. He learned they were delegates and high Soviet officials.

Delegates who came from all parts of the world and in local cases are unfamiliar with local customs were given guidance in the conference daily journal. One item expected to tip hotel employees 1 per cent of the total of their meal and other service checks.

Unhappy delegates in this city where it seems impossible to buy socks, shirts, pajamas or underwear were the two delegates from Egypt who lost all their luggage while flying from Cairo.

URGENT FURTHER PROBE In Infant's Death

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Oct. 18 (CP)—An inquiry into the death of a ten-month-old girl concluded late last night with a verdict that the baby died of a blunt instrument, inflicted by means of a blunt instrument. The jury recommended further action.

The child's mother, Mrs. Josephine McLean, 21, is detained on a holding charge of assault. She was brought back to Saint John today from Port Arthur, Ont., following her arrest on Oct. 5. The baby's body was found in a dump here Oct. 3. Mrs. McLean went to Ontario to join her husband, Sgt. Norman McLean, who returned recently after three years' service overseas. She was not called as a witness at the inquest.

The child was identified as Mary Louise Chaffey (McLean). Witnesses said Mrs. McLean had told them the father was a merchant seaman who had boarded at a neighboring home. Other testimony indicated that the mother had borrowed clothing for the baby, for the stated purpose of taking her to a relative's,
