April 28.—Marching to the same strains of glorious French music that inspired the 200 years ago, about 300 officers and men from the French training cruiser Jeanne d'Arc will parade at historic Grand Pre Park on the afternoon of June 3, Apple Blossom Sunday in the Annapolis Valley. The 6,000-ton cruiser will arrive in Halifax June 2 and a detachment will leave immediately for Kentville. She has on board 30 staff officers, 150 officers in training, 106 cadets and a crew of 202.

Police Clash With Strikers
 (C. P. Cable Via Reuters) (By Guardian's Special Wire) BOMBAY, India, April 28.—Fifteen policemen were hurt today in an encounter with 300 riotous oil-top-mill strikers. Officers fired 90 shots before the mob dispersed. Three strikers were sent to hospital with bullet wounds. The first clash occurred when about 1,000 strikers attacked a body of loyal workers and overpowered them. Police charged with staves and the strikers replied by hurling stones. It was in this fight that the 15 officers were hurt.

SUFFER LITTLE MOSQUITOES TO DRINK AT WILL
 (Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 30.—The National Research Council at Ottawa is taking up a suggestion from F. M. Selanders, commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade, that an effort be made to develop some form of anti-toxin against mosquito bites, according to a letter received by Mr. Selanders from Dr. H. M. Tory, president of the council.

In a letter to Dr. Tory, Mr. Selanders remarked that most of the woodsmen, constantly bitten by mosquitoes, become immunized against the poison. He also referred to the fact that some African natives immunize themselves against snake bites by eating the dried poison glands of snakes, gradually increasing the dose from an initial small quantity.

"I am very much interested in your suggestion," Dr. Tory wrote. "As a matter of fact, I have personally had a very similar experience to that of the woodsmen when you refer. During one of my college summer holidays I was asked to undertake the direction of the movement of a quantity of lumber suitable for wharf building in eastern Nova Scotia.

"I had to stay at a little cottage near the bank of a stream that had a great many waters suitable for mosquito breeding. During three hot nights I was nearly bitten to death by mosquitoes. Over almost
