Imperial Preference In Word And Deed

"WHOSE WORDS WOULD EVER BE IN DOUBT, DID NOT DEEDS UNRIDDLER THEM EACH DAY."

(Special Correspondent) OTTAWA, April 26—These Byronic lines are applicable to an immature minister, he who in a moment of uncontrolled plique and hardihood, rather than through ignorance, challenged the words of the Opposition Leader.

his 1937 tariff changes were considered in contrast. "How," said the opposition leader (of the House of Saskatchewan), "they must recall the halcyon days when Mr. Dunning invigorated and told the people that he would lead them into the promised land of a fifty percent cut in the British preferential rate, and free trade in everything they had to have... He (Mr. Dunning) said recently he never had been a free trader. He said in the Saskatchewan legislature, however, that he advocated placing upon the free list all foodstuffs. He demanded the reduction of the customs duty on goods imported from Great Britain to one-half of the rates charged under the general tariff. And that further gradual uniform reductions be made to the remaining tariff on British imports that would ensure complete free trade between Britain and Canada. Also he asked the people upon the free list of all agricultural implements, farm and household machinery, vehicles, fertilizers, coal, lumber, cement, gasoline, illuminating fuel and raw materials and machinery used in their manufacture. It would seem to indicate that there was not much to protect after he achieved free trade in all these items." And Minister of Agriculture Gardner was Mr. Dunning's active conductor.
