The longshoremen and the Shipping Federation held joint conference with Mr. Drubrel, the Fair Wage Officer of the Federal Department. The men agreed to finish this season at the old terms, but they will continue their fight in the Courts against the shipping Federation, insisting that the Federation has violated the terms of the contract made two years ago.

PROHIBITION IN P. E. ISLAND.

(Published by Request.)
To the Editor of The Witness:
Sir,—Mrs. Gordon Wright, of Hamilton, president of the W. C. T. U., in an address on temperance at a meeting in Fairmount Methodist Church, Montreal, is reported recently in your columns to have referred to the ideal conditions that prevail in Prince Edward Island, due to the fact that we have prohibition here.

I do not for a moment doubt the veracity of Mrs. Wright, and I have no doubt that things during her short stay among us were just then as she described them. But all the same the impression conveyed is misleading. Conditions here are not always so Arcadian as she pictures them. In fact they are the exception.

As one who lives here and who knows the usual conditions that prevail, I state without hesitation that in my opinion there is just as much liquor drunk here as there was before we had prohibition; that there is much drunken rowdism, particularly in our villages and on our railway trains; that there is more open, unblushing and expert perjury, that there is less respect for the majesty of law, that there is in general non-enforcement of law, and notably of prohibition, that the rum element snap their fingers at prohibition and boast that they can do as they please, and in general they do it.

Now, I do not hold prohibition to be responsible for all these things. But in a good measure it is responsible for no laws can be on our statute books and not be enforced without a tendency to bring all other laws into disrepute. It is notorious also that no serious effort has been put forth to enforce prohibition. Some effort has been made in and around Charlottetown to enforce prohibition, and as a result some low dives and "blind pigs" that supplied the very poor with liquor have been put out of business. These poor people now pay their bills better and are not so much of a burden on charitable organizations. But among those who are better off there is as much liquor drunk as ever there was.

Outside of Charlottetown practically nothing is done. Sometimes there is a half-hearted spasmodic effort made by prosecutors to do their duty, which usually comes to nothing. Between prosecutors, whose chief duty seems to be to draw their salaries regularly, and perjured witnesses, the rum-seller usually goes Scot free. Although prosecutors have a right to search the premises of those suspected of selling liquor, it is seldom done. Generally when an attempt is to be made the rum-seller has word of it, and, of course, no liquor is found.

Prosecutors say that the temperance people won't stand behind them and will give them no help or countenance. They complain that these good people shun them lest they be suspected of giving them information. There seems to be a measure of truth in this complaint, for I have noticed that when the prosecutor comes here he seems to be shunned and people do not want to be seen talking with him lest they be regarded as informers and spies. Those who used to send in names of rum-sellers against the rum-sellers complain that it is no use to do so, for either the prosecutor won't act or he will give away their names. In the one case it is useless, and in the other they gain the ill-will not only of the rum-seller, but of their neighbors. There seems to be some truth in both points of view, that of the reformers and that of the prosecutor. But in both cases the law is not enforced.

It is said that many of our drug stores sell liquor illegally, and that many of our doctors prescribe it when they know it to be used as a beverage. I am sorry to say there is a great deal of truth in this statement. This is regarded by many to be the chief reason for the failure of prohibition, and on the surface it might appear that the true reason does not lie here.

It seems to me that the true reason lies in the fact that the temperance sentiment back of the law is not strong enough to cause its thorough enforcement. This law was placed on the statute book at the in-

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre.—Duties:—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

stigation of the temperance people of this province. The politicians put it there at their request, as they have put many other laws they don't believe in. They will not try to enforce them because they will lose votes thereby, and in small constituencies like ours every vote counts. If they gained the temperance vote by doing their duty they would do it. But the temperance people won't leave their party no matter what happens. This is at the root of the matter.

This law will never be enforced here till the temperance people are prepared to throw every other political consideration to the winds for their ideal, till they are prepared to practice some sacrifice of self, money, friends. This, I am persuaded they are not prepared to do, or least so far they do not seem to want to sacrifice anything to enforce this law. They try to get out of it by expecting others to do the sacrificing.

As conditions exist today they ought in common honesty to do this or ask for the repeal of a law which is our most prolific source of perjury, and whose enforcement is a farce.

EIGHTEEN MEN KILLED IN EXPLOSION

VIVIAN, West Virginia, November 18.—Eighteen men were killed in a coal dust explosion which occurred today in the Bottom Creek mine of the Bottom Creek Coal and Coke company at this place. Over 150 men were in the mine at the time of the explosion, but all escaped excepting 18 of the 22 who were in the explosion zone. Four of these were rescued alive. Among the men killed were Engineers W. H. Henderson, of Rockville, Md.; E. H. Harvey, of Philadelphia; Marvin Williams of Keystone, W. Va.; and Charles Brewer, of Elk Horn, W. Va., who were in a party of five, making a semi-annual survey of the mine. Alexander Williams, the engineer was saved. The others killed were negroes or foreigners.
