THE LATE G. W. SIMPSON.

The worst fears were swiftly realized with regard to the illness of Hon. George Simpson, who died at his home at an early hour yesterday morning. The onset of his malady was relentless and despite heroic and no doubt skilful treatment his life could not be saved. The occurrence has its aspects of unusual sadness. When the husband and father, the breadwinner of the household, is thus taken away, it is always one of the saddest occurrences in mundane affairs. In this instance the swiftness of the stroke, and the fact that the children are at an age when they greatly need a father's care, affection and kindness must powerfully appeal to all sympathetic minds.

Mr. Simpson was of the class whose removal creates a wide vacancy in the community in which he lived. He had an alert mind; he read and thought more than most men who follow agricultural pursuits, and the bent of his mind was toward the advancement of the community in social, moral and religious as well as political affairs. These qualities together with his ready gift of speech, naturally made him a local leader in many lines of useful activity, outside of the home circle in which he was so greatly beloved. The shadow of death in this instance extends far on every side of the sorely stricken home circle.

On entering public life as a member of the Legislature in 1900 he quickly gained a footing as one of the readiest debaters among the younger members of the House. Already he had gained a seat in the Provincial, and the Liberal party in tribute to his recognised ability and knowledge of public affairs had named him as a standard-bearer in the larger arena of Federal affairs. It was doubly sad that with the broader field thus opening before him, and in the vigor of middle age his life should be thus cut off. It is one of the dark mysteries of human affairs that the vigorous, the promising and the useful are thus called away, while others whose capacity is small, or whose work is apparently done, and even the few who may have found life's burdens too heavy to be borne, are left behind.

The Guardian tenders its heartfelt and respectful sympathy to Mrs. Simpson, the children and other near relatives of the deceased.

There appears a growing impression that the candidature of Hearst for the Governorship of New York is making headway. The New York Post, which is strongly opposed to him apparently fears that he may be elected. While the Republicans have an undoubtedly able and clean candidate in Mr. Hughes, he has an ascetic face and not very much of the popular element in his make-up.

It is now stated that the nomination of Dr. Weldon in Queens-Shelburne was brought about by the Conservatives in Ontario. It is more probable, we think, that Dr. Weldon is really laying a foundation for the next general election, with possibly no great hope of winning in the present contest. He is a man in many ways superior to the average member of Parliament, and we doubt not that his promotion will yet come, though not immediately.

TORONTO FIRE LOSS IS \$245,000

TORONTO, Oct. 21.—Dr. Orr, manager of the exhibition, estimates the loss in last night's fire at \$245,000. "The grand stand," said he, "cost \$108,000, and the stables are worth about \$5,000 each. The transportation building could not be replaced for \$125,000. If it had not been for a perfectly organized fire department the entire grounds would have been swept. A hurricane was blowing and the brigade picked the fire and got it into a corner. The wind was blowing in the direction of the transportation building. A spark set fire to some paper with which the exhibitors had covered a window."

The insurance is divided up among 48 companies. Their shares will range from half to five per cent of the loss.

"We kept just as high insurance on the buildings as we could," said the city treasurer, "on account of their inaccessibility and inflammability."

The board of control this morning decided that the work of rebuilding should go on as soon as possible. The board will visit the exhibition grounds and confer with the exhibition association to arrange plans.

There is strong suspicion of incendiarism.

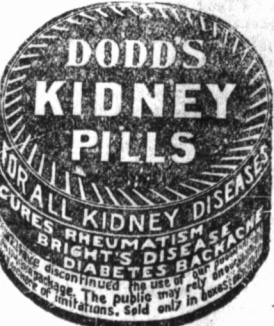

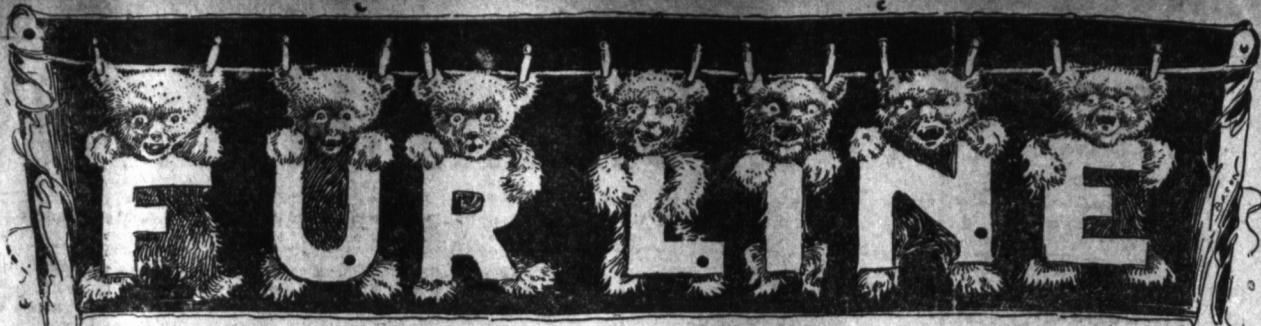
