**An Amendment to Immigration Act**

(From Our Own Correspondent)

OTTAWA, June 26.—It will be remembered that in 1919, as the result of the labour riots in Winnipeg, section 41 of the Immigration Act providing for the deportation of certain undesirable persons, was inserted. Since that time labour organizations throughout Canada have been endeavoring to have it eliminated. This year a bill was introduced (April 10th) for its repeal. It was strongly opposed by certain members of the Opposition, but was passed by the House April 30th.

This bill was designed to make deportation for certain causes dependent upon a conviction in Canada, under Part II of the Criminal Code relating to offences against public order, rather than upon a hearing before a Board of Inquiry concerning certain offences under section 41 of the Immigration Act. Of such undesirable classes were provided by sections 40, 42 and 43 of the Act, and under those sections deportation may be carried out. It was considered that the provisions of section 41 were unnecessary as section 40 and Part II of Dec., 136%.
