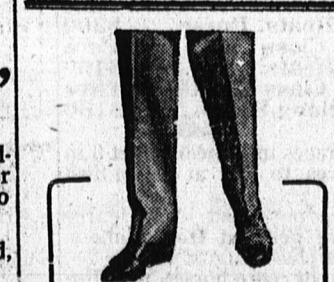

COLLISION ON BRIDGE—On Saturday night, when Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Rombough were driving across Hillsboro Bridge, they met about the middle of the bridge, coming in the opposite direction three teams. The occupants were evidently drunk, and were singing and shouting. Two of the teams were racing abreast on opposite sides of the bridge. Mr. Rombough endeavored to turn off his horse to one side to avoid a collision, but the horse and carriage overturned, he and his wife thrown out, both being badly shaken up, and the wagon partly demolished. The young men who are responsible for this act, drove on paying not the slightest attention to Mr. and Mrs. Rombough, and not stopping to see how badly they were hurt, or what damage they had inflicted. REV. J. M. MCINNIS, HALIFAX—The Halifax Mail says: "There is a most welcome visitor in town—Rev. John M. McInnis, a former minister of Park street church, who arrived Saturday evening from Prince Edward Island, and who is now pastor of the South Presbyterian church, Syracuse, New York, a church with a membership of 13,000 and one of the largest Presbyterian churches in New York state. Mr. McInnis, who is looking remarkably well, preached to two large congregations yesterday in that church, where he will occupy the pulpit for four Sundays. Mrs. McInnis is spending the Summer in Pennsylvania. In conversation with the Mail, Mr. McInnis stated Canadians are very prominent in the great work of the Presbyterian church in the United States. All over the country they are holding positions of leadership. In Syracuse, Mr. Cook, formerly of Halifax, is prominent in the business world, and Professor Archibald, also of this city, formerly held a chair in the university, but was recently called to British Columbia. Professor Metzler, dean of the graduates school of the University, is also a Canadian. For his text yesterday morning Mr. McInnis took the words "As an eagle stirreth her nest, Addressing himself straight to the great struggle, he, with inclusive force, sought to show that God, through it was stirring the nations that they might "find their souls." The nations which are totally untouched by it are more in danger than any others of losing that, in comparison with which, all things else are as nothing."
