**ANTI-CHRISTIAN RIOTS.**  
Anti-Christian riots have broken out in the Province of Kiang Si.

The Chinese have destroyed a large section of the Manchurian Railway, burning the stations.

### JANUARY 14th SET FOR TRIAL.

PATERSON, N. J., November 16.—Walter McAllister, Andrew Campbell, William Death and George Kerr, indicted for the murder of Jennie Boschietter, the mill girl, were arranged here to-day before supreme court Judge Dixon. The court room was crowded. The four men pleaded not guilty and Judge Dixon set January 14th for the trial.

### BURNED AT THE STAKE.

LIMON, Colo., November 16.—Chained to a railroad rail set firmly in the ground on the exact spot where his fiendish crime was committed, Preston Porter, Jr., or as he was familiarly known, John Porter, this evening paid the penalty for his deed the fiendish assault and cruel murder of little Louise Frost, whose mutilated body was found hidden among the bushes the day after the crime was committed. It was 6.23 o'clock when the father of the murdered girl touched the match to the fuel piled around the stake and twenty minutes later a last convulsive shudder told that life was extinct.

### BUBONIC AT THE CAPE.

WASHINGTON, November 16.—United States Consul General Knight at Cape has informed the state department that the plague is declared officially to exist in the interior of the colony. The information was communicated at once to the marine hospital service.

### MANY HOUSES GOING UP.

SYDNEY, November 16.—The Dominion Coal Company are erecting a large number of houses for miners at Glace Bay. One contracting firm will erect ninety between the town and Dominion No. 4, thus connecting the two towns.

### WORK ON BELL ISLAND.

The Dominion Iron and Steel Company now 700 men working in their mine at Bell Island, and it is expected that by the end of the week 1,000 men will be at work there. As a result of the strike on the Island last summer, the Nova Scotia Steel Company were obliged to cancel a number of their contracts, and consequently their mine now is practi-cally closed, there being only about thirty men working.—Halifax Chronicle.
