# HALIFAX BASEBALL TEAM COMING

A program of sports will be first run off beginning at 2 o'clock, including sprints and bicycle races which will last about 3 o'clock.

The baseball game will then start between the Wanderers and Abbies. The grandstand is being rushed to completion by a large staff of men under the direction of Mr. E. Parkman and it is expected that it will be so far completed by Dominion Day to seat the most of those who attend the sports.

# PROVINCIAL RIFLE ASSOCIATION

The fifty-second annual report of the Provincial Rifle Association of Prince Edward Island for last year, which is to be presented at the annual meeting of the Association to be held in Charlottetown to-morrow evening, has just been issued, and makes interesting reading to the riflemen in this province. The report is made by Lieut.-Col. D. Stewart, R. O., Chairman, and Major A. A. Burtlett, Secretary-Treasurer.

Inter alia they state:—"We think we can offer you our congratulations on the result generally of your efforts for 1912. There are some causes for congratulation, and some for regret. You can be congratulated, we consider, on securing for your Patron a generous-hearted and whole-souled citizen in the person of Frank R. Hartz, Esq., who presented us with a larger contribution to our funds than ever before given to our Association by any individual. His action rendered possible the inclusion in your prize-list of the largest made from a monetary standpoint that we have ever had in any prize list of the past. A second cause for gratulation is the fact that never before in the history of this Assn have you had so large a prize, viz., \$1,337, which is a grand raise of some \$400 since 1908."

And these two congratulations we are to offset two regrets, one that the riflemen of this province should poorly appreciate the generous amount of money that you have, as to patronize the annual meeting in such reduced number and in the second place, that this non-participation of the riflemen there should be a balance again at the Bank of \$130.37.

# ANNUAL PRIZE MEETING

The annual prize meeting was held in Kertown Rifle Range on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 13th, 14th, and 15th, 1912, and good weather prevailed. All that wanted to make the meeting an unqualified success was a larger number of competitors.
