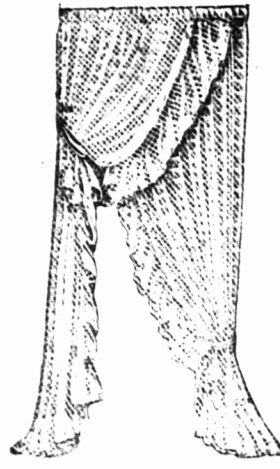

7 o'clock this morning.

THE S. S. Stanley left Picou yester-
day morning at 7 a. m. and arrived in
this port at 12 15, with a large cargo
of freight and 100 bags of mail.

REV. G. W. FISHER, Methodist Min-
ister at Fairville, N. B., and well
known here, has been suffering some-
what from ill-health of late but is im-
proving.

LETTERS from Rev. L. G. Maeneill, at
Clifton Springs, N. Y., state that he has
recovered from the cold, but the nerv-
ous trouble still continues. The spe-
cialist who is treating him says Mr.
Maeneill will be obliged to take two or
three months' complete rest from study,
reading, etc. The trouble has been
brought on by overwork.

The clergymen of Tryon are all from
the old country. Rev. Mr. Hicks, Meth-
odist minister, came from Manchester,
England. Rev. Mr. Price, Pastor of the
Baptist Church was born in Wales,
and Rev. Mr. Robertson was born and
educated in Scotland, while the Presby-
terian minister who preceded him, the
Rev. Mr. Quinn, was a native of the
Emerald Isle.

In front of Messrs Mark Wright &
Co's furniture store yesterday
noticed a beautiful piece of workman-
ship. Upon enquiry, Mr. Wright informed
THE GUARDIAN that it was the new
triple settee for the pulpit of the First
Methodist Church of this city, on its way
from their factory to the upholstering
room. It is massive in appearance and
is built of quartered oak, upholstered
with velvet rugs. The design is from
Burke's plans and is the contribution
of the Ladies' Aid Society. When placed
in position it will enhance the appear-
ance of the platform to a large degree.

DURING the coming summer a num-
ber of new ministers will be installed
into St. John's pulpits. At present
Trinity church, St. Matthew's Presby-
terian church and Brussels street Bapt-
ist church are without pastors, and the
Jewish synagogue is also vacant. The
Leinster street Baptist church pulpit
has been vacant for some time, but
early next month the new minister, Rev.
Mr. Smith, will take charge. Papers
to-day announce that Rev. Dr. Bruce
may leave the city. Rev. J. A. Gordon,
of the Main street Baptist church, still
has under consideration a call to the
Pacific coast. These are some of the
probable changes. Others will occur
at the Methodist conference in June. It
is understood Rev. Mr. Fisher will
leave Fairville, to be succeeded by Rev.
Mr. Shenton, whose place at Exmouth
street will probably be taken by Rev. T.
J. Deinstadt. The pastors of the Co-
burg street Christian and the St. An-
drew's Presbyterian church are absent
on sick leave.

THE following students returned
yesterday on the Stanley from Dal-
lousie.—D. W. McKenzie, Flat River;
Geo. H. Ross, Baddeck and M. J. Mc-
Pherson, Ugg. The rest of the stu-
dents will return later. Although no
results have yet been published, the
Island boys have maintained their
usual high standing. A student from
P. E. I. is now regarded above the
average Dalhousian. Convocation takes
place on 26 h.

INSPECTOR McCormac on the 11th
and 12th examined the Montague
School, and was very much pleased
indeed with the readiness with which
the pupils answered the questions pu-
t to them. The inspector was glad to
see the school in a healthy condition.
From the primary department to the
Principal's room, all the teachers de-
serve praise for the progress made in
school for the last year. Mr. Jay, the
Principal, is doing good work, so did
Mr. McDonald his predecessor who
retired the 1st of January last. The
examination was the best that had been
held in Montague for years. Mr. Mc-
Cormac worked hard for two days, 5
hours each day, and we believe he is
the right man in the right place. There
were 150 scholars present during the
examination and the Inspector instructed
the rate payers to provide more
school accommodation, as the rooms
are too much crowded. At the close re-
marks were made by Mr. Inman,
Barrister, who assisted in the exami-
nation by asking questions. Several
rate payers also made favourable re-
marks. Mr. Jay, the principal, com-
plimented the rate payers on having
such painstaking trustees who are so at-
tentive to the wants of the school.

THE Rev. Geo. C. Robertson, recently
pastor of the Presbyterian church of
Cape Breton, having accepted a call from
the Presbyterian churches of Tryon,
Hampden and Bonshaw, gave his intro-
ductory sermon in Tryon last Sunday
evening. Notwithstanding the bad
state of the roads, and the unpleasant-
ness in travelling, a large number of
people belonging to the different de-
nominations, wended their way to the
church through slush, mud and water,
to listen to the rev. gentleman the
first time. Having selected his text
from the Acts of the Apostles 10:9:
"Therefore came I unto you without
gainsaying, as soon as I was sent for!
I ask therefore with what intent ye
have sent for me?" He at once, in a
clear, impressive and logical manner,
entered into the spirit of his subject,
expatiating at considerable length on
the responsibility and accountability, of
a minister of the gospel, in relation to
his church and people, showing conclu-
sively that instead of endeavoring to
please the people by exhibitions of ora-
tory, and high sounding words, he
should in plain and simple language,
preach Christ and him crucified. This,
said he, is my mission unto you, to
preach Christ and him crucified, glory-
ing in nothing save the cross of Christ.
The Rev. gentleman then, in language
full of zeal and anxiety, urged upon his
people the importance and necessity of
working together for the upbuilding of
the church and for the salvation of their
immortal souls. The Presbyterian
people of Tryon, Hampden and Bonshaw
are to be complimented on their choice
of a pastor.
