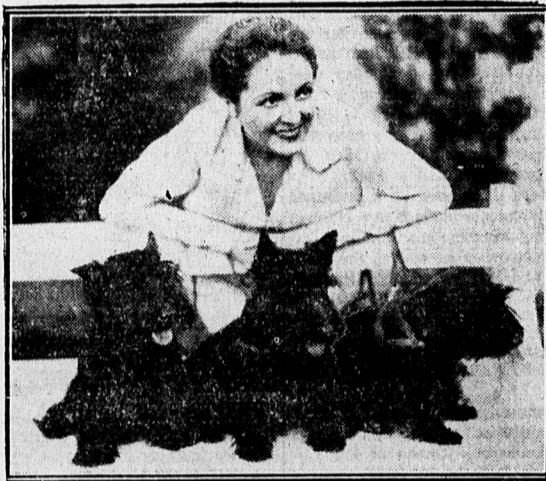


SLAYING INVESTIGATION HINGES ON LOVE-DIARY
A tiny silk-covered diary, which bares in its frankly-written pages the love affairs into which Starr Faithfull, daughter of a wealthy manufacturing chemist, tempestuously flung herself, and as rapidly forgot, was relied on to place her strange death definitely in the category of premeditated murder. Lurid facts and conjectures involved in the case of the girl, whose body was swept ashore off Long Beach last weekend, were presented to a grand jury at Mineola, L. I. 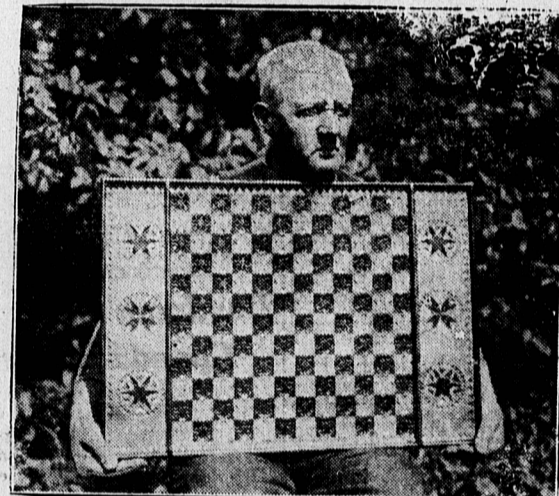
BILLIE DOVE AND THREE BRAW SCOTTIES

Here is shown an excellent picture of the start of the national challenge trophy race for small-powered boats, which was contested in rough weather at Poole, England, recently.—London News.



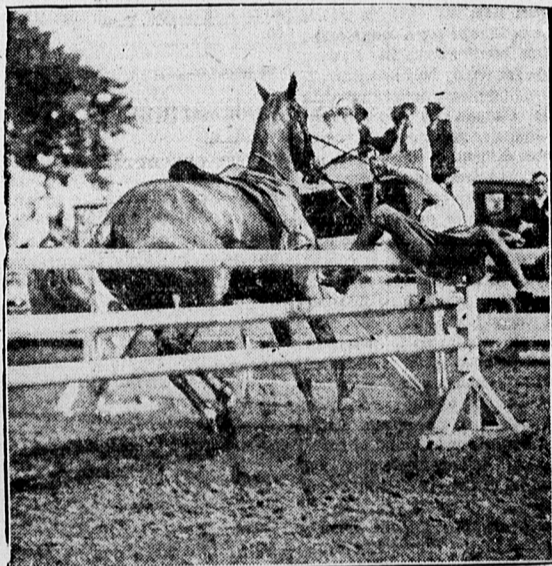
CARVES WOOD USING ONLY A PENKNIFE

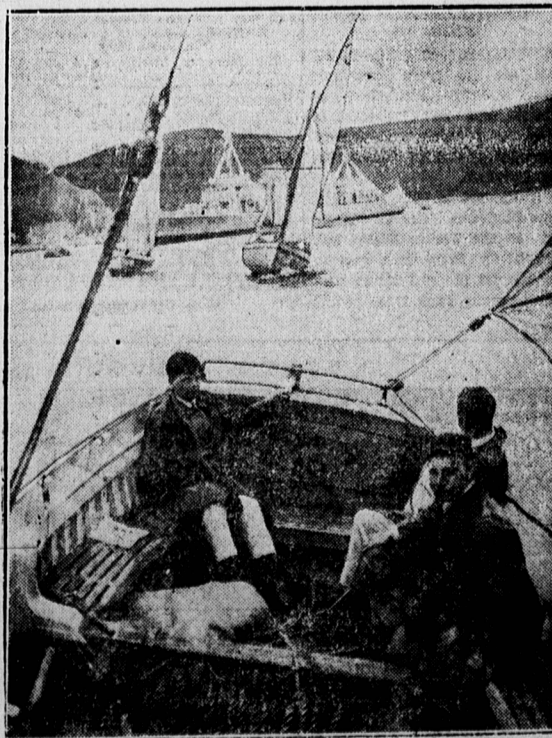
GIVES EXHIBITION IN FAMOUS BLUEBIRD

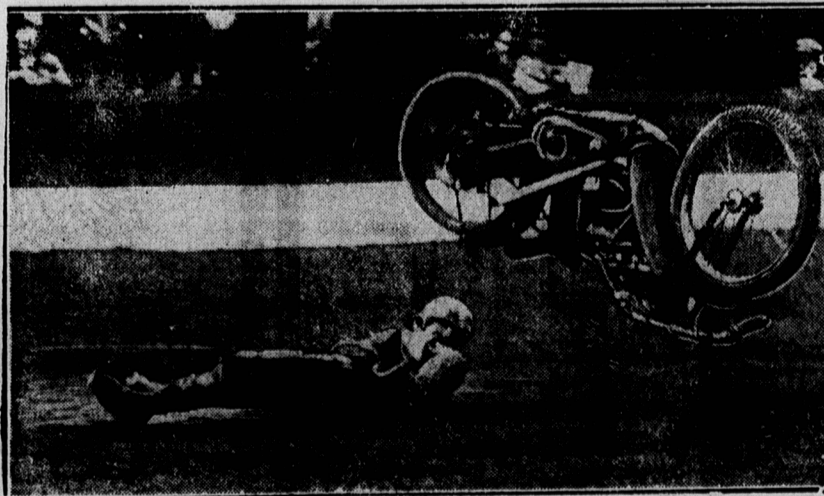
VETERAN AT 12
