The Dominion Day Races at S'side is always in the money, and Peter Summerside this year, in connection with the Diamond Jubilee Celebration, promise to be bigger and better than ever. July 1st is generally considered Summerside's day for putting on a programme of the Sport of Kings and the island's best and fastest horseflesh will be at Summerside. Those who were present at last year's races saw one of the best cards of the 1926 racing season and it is doubtful if any racing fixture throughout the season provided such close and exciting finishes. In the Free For All, the 2.20 Trot and the 2.30 mixed there is a splendid list of entries and a glance at the list will show that it is any horse's win until the final wire. The return of Bud Hal to the island gives new interest in racing circles as his reputation is well known and it will be a great race with him, Dan Patchen, Long Set, Keemah Aubrey and Mike McGregor. There should be exceptionally fast time Dominion Day as the new revised rules of the National Trotting Association remove any advantages in holding a horse in. There should be a dandy race in the 2.20 Trot as Ruby Aubrey, who won last Dominion Day and also won the big match race on the ice at Summerside last winter, The Pup, the popular little trotter who

is always in the money, and Peter Verde, who is Mac Steele's best bet and who has made a big reputation in the Maine Circuit, with British Ginger, Princess Aubrey and Mac Creseus other real fast horses competing there should be SOME RACE. There are also seven good ones in the 2.30 mixed among which is the fast mare Evelyn Aubrey, owned by George Calbeck, who is returning to the track, and other speedy horses we will see go for all they are worth on Dominion Day.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 25.—With only D. M. Greig, Hon. Cecil Campbell and C. Philcox left in the men's singles and they being almost doomed to fall before the respective onslaughts of Kozeluh, Czechoslovakia, Borotra, of France and Timmer of Holland in their next matches, Great Britain must turn to the ladies' singles events for consolation in the International Tennis matches here.

The pairings of the last eight players so far reached today included the following: Mrs. Godfree vs. Miss Ryan; Senora D'Alvarez vs. Mrs. Watson; Mrs. Peacock vs. the winner of the Miss Wills-Miss Goldsack event, while another battle of youth, confined, this time, however, to two English girls brought up the second half of the draw with Betty Nuthal vs. Miss Joan Fry.

**Holiday Traffic  
Heavy On Canadian  
National Railways**

(Special to The Guardian)  
MONTREAL, June 25.—The forthcoming double National holiday on Dominion Day, July 1st and the day following will see greater volume of passenger traffic on Canadian railroads than has ever been experienced in the opinion of C. W. Johnston, passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railways.

"Canadians are apparently decided upon celebrating jubilee by seeing as much of Canada as they can within the holiday period," Mr. Johnston stated. Already, with the closing of schools, traffic in and out of Montreal has reached greater proportions than ever before and indications are that the traffic next weekend for jubilee celebrations will surpass all previous records.

"In preparation for this, all steel passenger train equipment has been concentrated at strategic points and will be placed on various trains as required to handle the overflow. The operation of several new trains, 'The Confederation' Toronto-Vancouver; 'The Acadia' Montreal-Halifax; and 'The Maple Leaf' connecting Chicago-Toronto-Montreal and Ottawa, has provided additional fast services for Canadians and for persons from other countries visiting this country for their holidays, and has given a decided boost to the 'holiday in Canada' movement which the Canadian National system is fostering."

Holiday traffic in and out of Montreal commenced during the past weekend Mr. Johnston stated. "The continental limited" from Montreal to the Pacific coast has been carrying capacity loads of passengers bound for Jasper National Park and Pacific coast points; "The International Limited" Montreal to Chicago, has been taxed to the limit with travellers for Toronto, London, Detroit, Chicago and intermediate points; "The Ocean Limited" and "The Maritime Express" have for several days carried extra equipment to handle the movement to lower St. Lawrence resorts and to the beautiful spots of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island while the local trains out of Montreal to the Laurentians; Huberdeau branch resorts, Quebec and Murray Bay, have each had their full complement of holiday-seekers.

By Canadian Team**

BISLEY CAMP, England, June 25.—Excellent practice at both the Stickle Down and Century ranges was obtained today by the Canadian Bisley team, which has enjoyed on the whole, good weather since it arrived early this week.

In a few days it was hoped to arrange inter-team shoots with other teams of competitors of whom comparatively few have arrived so far. The National Rifle Association meeting at Bisley, which will draw many marksmen for all over the empire, will be from July 4th to 16th.

Among the teams of marksmen expected to compete were groups representing India, Hong Kong, Nigeria, Channel Islands, British Guinea, Trinidad, Nyasaland and the Gold Coast.

Next week will be "service week." The navy, army, air force and marines will hold their annual matches, with all kinds of small arms used in the services, for team and individual championships.

Miss Blanche Babcock, the only competitor qualified by her service to enter the King's prize with any prospect of success, was expected to appear again. Last year she missed attaining the final hundred—the final stage—by only one shot.

NEW YORK, June 25.—President John A. Heydler, of the National League today fined Earl Smith, catcher, of the Pittsburgh club, \$500 and suspended him for 30 days from June 18th for what the league executive termed "a vicious and brutal assault on a player of a competing club."

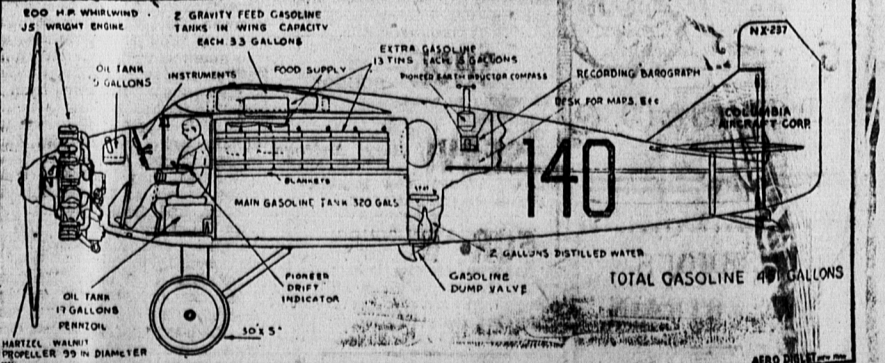
