

YESTERDAY'S SESSIONS OF PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

Many Questions of Importance Discussed at the Sittings—College Work Engages Attention in Morning, Sabbath School Work etc. in Afternoon and Home and Foreign Missions in Evening.

SECOND SIDERUNT.

The second sederunt met pursuant to the adjournment in Zion Church at ten o'clock yesterday morning. The Synod engaged for half an hour in devotional exercises after which the minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

COLLEGE BOARD.

Dr Sedgwick on behalf of the College board addressed the Synod. He referred to the deficit of \$800 last year and pointed out that college can never be as it should when deficits are reported from year to year.

Dr. Falcoer in seconding spoke of the value of importing new blood but in the future as a Synod we must make up our minds to produce our own men.

Rev. Jas. McGregor McKay, New Glasgow (retired) spoke of the pleasure with which he had listened to the previous remarks.

be. Reports of the General Assembly say that religion is going back in family worship, in intercession and in the Sabbath Schools. To judge by the improvement of the Colleges we should be going ahead.

The motion was carried unanimously. After Rev Mr Miller, Yarmouth had spoken briefly on the subject of giving the power to remit rents of professors' houses and adding same to the salary of fourth prof. or that motion was also carried.

The Presbytery of Halifax was instructed to take the necessary steps to induce Dr McGill into the chair.

Dr. Falcoer introduced the subject of the scarcity of material for the college. The impression had gone abroad that there was an over supply. He spoke of the secular nature of the schools today, and the tendency to the neglect of the liberal arts for the sciences as partly the cause.

After Dr Murray, Editor of the Presbyterian Witness Rev T F Rev Fullerton, Dr Sedgwick, and others had spoken endorsing the scheme the motion carried.

A motion that the Synod recommend Dr Falcoer to succeed Dr Pollock was withdrawn as not in order after a unanimous approval of this suggestion had been received.

Rev Dr McCurdy submitted a printed report of the Hunter Church Building Fund. There was a total of \$800 paid out last year against \$1190 the previous year.

THIRD SIDERUNT. The third sederunt opened by singing, and prayer by Dr Reid after which this

synod was constituted by the Moderator. The minutes of last sederunt were read and sustained.

Judge Forbes, St. John, submitted the report of the trustees of the century Manse and Church Building Fund. There has this year been invested \$11,768.23 and \$8000 previously leaving a balance of \$3,234.70.

Dr. Forest, in moving that the report be received and adopted spoke briefly of the benefit the fund had done. He moved that the report be received and adopted, which motion with the appointment of new directors was carried.

NEXT PLACE OF MEETING.

Rev. Mr. Carson, Pictou, asked that the church meet in Prince Street Church, Pictou next year. A motion in accordance was carried.

A motion that the synod meet the first Monday in October instead of Tuesday was defeated.

Rev. McLeod Harvey, Worcester, Mass., from the Presbytery of Boston read a communication embodying a motion that be present the question of the emigration of Presbyterians from Canada to the U. S. that they be not lost to the church.

Rev. A McLean Sinclair said the board had found to the best of their knowledge the new professor a man sound in the faith. The Iris Church is generally sound in the faith.

A motion cordially reciprocating the greetings of Boston and asking all ministers to send the addresses of all Presbyterian young people removing to Massachusetts was unanimously carried.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Dr. Falcoer in the absence of the Moderator Rev. D. S. Fraser commended on the printed report which was submitted. The statistics were favorable. He recommended the supplemental grading courses. In the present international lessons there are drawbacks which are supplemented by the grading course.

The following recommendations were unanimously accepted on motion of Prof. Falcoer seconded by Rev Geo Millar, Brookfield.

1. That this Synod expresses its high appreciation and approval of the Summer Schools for S Teachers and Workers conducted with so much success at Halifax, St. John, Charlottetown and Sydney, by the committee of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and the Synod's S S Committee; that these Committees be requested to conduct a similar school in the College at Halifax, during the summer of 1904 if possible; and that in consultation with Presbyteries, schools be held at such other centres as may be found most suitable in the interests of the work throughout the bounds of the Synod.

2. That Presbyteries be strongly recommended to hold within their respective bounds local schools for their Sunday School teachers along the lines generally indicated in the body of this Report.

3. That this Synod express its thanks to the Assembly's S S Committee for the grant of \$700.00 from the Children's Day Fund for the expenses of Sabbath School work within the bounds; and that the Assembly's Committee, be requested, as it is hereby requested to place at the disposal of the Synod's S S Committee a sum sufficient for the carrying on of its work during its next synodical year.

4. That all our schools be recommended to use our lesson helps and illustrated papers; to contribute to missions; and, as far as possible, to avail themselves of the advantages of the Assembly's Teachers Training course, to give due prominence to the teaching of Temperance, and to make as large a use as possible of the Home Department.

In discussing the previous questions Dr. Isaac Murray, New Glasgow spoke of some of the lessons given at the Summer Schools and sent forth as sanctioned by the Synod which he considered address to the views of the Synod. Regarding prophecy there has been told, that prophecy was at first muddy

Rev. R. D. Fraser, Editor and business manager of Church Publications, Toronto in standing before the Synod for the first time spoke of his father who had come to Canada as a missionary seventy years ago. He eulogized the work of Dr. Fotheringham, who had laid such a sure foundation for the publications. Speaking of Sunday School Work he said the church owed much to Dr. Falcoer in this province as in the east. His errand was to meet the brethren and hear what they had to say. He need not plead for the printing press, its power is known. He told of the different publications issued and their object to make good Christians, good Presbyterians, and good Canadians. The finances are in good conditions, the papers have been enlarged and a balance of \$10,000 or \$11,000 accumulated as capital. The co-operation is needed of ministers and elders to make the publications of these works a greater and greater success.

Rev. Thomas Cumming reported on behalf of the Directors of the Ladies College. The general impression of the visit was most favorable. He referred to a very creditable exercise by Miss McLeod daughter of the pastor of Zion Church. He was impressed by the thoroughness of the instruction imparted. His Report referred to the changes in the College during the past year and the need for continued effort on behalf of the College.

Rev. Mr. Carson, Pictou, followed seconding the resolution that the report be adopted.

The moderator and the retiring moderator were appointed visitors for next year. Rev. Dr. Sedgwick presented the statement by committee on Widows and Orphans Funds. He was glad that the report was a most favorable one showing an increase of assets and a good balance with the prospects of large legacies coming in probably before Synod again meets. By the increase in assets the rates have been reduced and the annuities enlarged. He moved a resolution, supported by Rev. A McLean Sinclair, Rev. J. McKay, Rev. J. W. McKinnis, Toronto N.S.; Rev. Dr. Grant, Moderator and the veteran John Grierston. Full reports of these excellent addresses will appear tomorrow.
