Emmett Topplin, of Loyola University, took single honors for the competitions when he twice tied the record for the 60 yard dash and ran Eddie Tolan, the negro crack from Detroit into the ground.

Alex. Wilson, of Montreal, running under the banner of Notre Dame, scored the most brilliant triumph when he unloosed a terrific finish drive to win the 600-yard sprint. If Wilson runs for Canada at the Olympics next summer he is almost certain to capture this event, as there is no one in the United States who can hold him at the distance.

M.A.A.A. WILL REGALS WIN FACE MCGILL MCGLEAN CUP

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 25.—Montreal Amateur Athletic Association tonight won the right to face McGill University for the championship of the senior group of the Province of Quebec Amateur Hockey Association. This group usually produces the province's competitor for the Allan Cup play-downs. M. A. A. A. tonight defeated Canadiens in the second of a two-game, total goals to count, series, 3-1 and captured the round, 4-3. Canadiens won the first match on Monday by 2-1. The two teams finished in a tie for second place in the regular league series. Dates for the McGill-M. A. A. A. series will be announced later.

The game was very fast, both teams working hard. In the first period, Frank Woodside scored for Summerside, from a long shot from centre ice. In the second period a Summerside player batted the puck in his own net, making the Regals' winning tally. In the third period, Summerside had the edge on the play, both teams worked hard but could not score.

Hearings Begin In Hydro Probe

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 25. (By the Canadian Press)—Nothing will be heard by the Middleton Royal Commission, appointed to enquire into the payment of \$50,000 by the Ontario Hydro Commission to John Aird, Jr., regarding the propriety of the payment of \$1,800,000 to M. J. O'Brien Limited for their rights on the Mississippi and Madawaska rivers. This was made clear by Mr. Justice W. E. Middleton, the Commissioner, in the first sitting today when A. G. Slight, K. C., appearing for Liberal and Progressive leaders of Ontario, attempted to deal with that phase of the matter.

The question of the \$50,000 payment to Aird, he pointed out, was tied up with the larger payment to O'Brien, because it was supposedly for negotiating the sale of the O'Brien property to the hydro that the \$50,000 had been paid. His Lordship, however, said he was not called upon to decide whether the hydro commission had made a good bargain or not.

When opening the enquiry Mr. Justice Middleton outlined the scope of the enquiry and expressed the hope no attempt would be made by counsel to "ventilate political grievances or introduce acrimonious discussion of irrelevant matter." The Hydro Commission's payment of \$22,000,000 for the Dominion Power and Transmission company's properties will be investigated later.

John Aird, Jr., first witness today, reviewed his connection with the Madawaska purchase negotiations. His first proposition was to develop the O'Brien power rights himself and sell the power to the hydro at \$16.50 per h. p. but the Hydro commission had rejected this proposition. He then endeavored to sell the property to hydro for

the O'Briens and it was eventually agreed he should stand aside and permit the hydro commission to negotiate directly with the M. J. O'Brien company. He had no option on the property, but had what he termed "an understanding" with the O'Briens. Altogether he thought he had worked on the deal two or three years and had furnished the hydro commission with much data and engineering details about the property.
