Appointed To U.S. Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (AP)—Harvard University's noted liberal professor Felix Frankfurter, outspoken champion of the view that the constitution is an elastic document framed to meet the changing needs of a changing society, was appointed to the United States Supreme Court today by President Roosevelt.

The Senate made it unmistakably apparent it would confirm the nomination. With some exceptions, Senators of all political and economic faiths applauded the appointment and praised the professor for his legal scholarly attainments. The exceptions were principally members of the democratic bloc which defeated the President's effort to reorganize the Supreme Court in 1937. Acknowledging Frankfurter's ability, they nevertheless declined for the moment to commit themselves to his support. Since the battle of 1937, their first disposition is to examine with the utmost care any proposition affecting the courts.



Scout News and Notices

Christmas gifts for 100,000 kiddies who otherwise would have been missed by Santa Claus was once again achieved by the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of Canada, working in a chain of toy and doll repair shops stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The discarded or broken toys were secured with the support of local newspapers, churches, service clubs, public schools and the radio. In many places toy-repair mission matinees were given by movie theatre managers. Firemen in Saskatoon, Edmonton, Ottawa, Chatham and other centres shared in the practical work of making, repairing and painting wooden toys.

In many centres the toy distribution was made in co-operation with the welfare organizations and service clubs. Scouts of the needy districts of Saskatoon were assisted in meeting the heavy demands upon the Prairie Santa Claus by bulk shipments of gifts from eastern toy centres, London, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, St. John's, Que. Other toy shops mailed Christmas parcels to individual families in Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The Scout-Guide-Herald Sunshine Toy Shop at Calgary secured lists of children from the clergy of every parish between Red Deer and the U.S. boundary. Early in November Victoria Scouts placed 600 toys aboard the B.C. Coast Mission ship and other centres shared in the boat's ports of call.

Credit for development of the Christmas Scout Toy Repair Shop as an annual good turn on a large scale was given the Scouts of Canada in the Weekly News Bulletin of Imperial Boy Scout Headquarters. After telling of the success of similar Scout Toy Shops in London, Dundee, Glasgow, Manchester and other Old Country cities, also in Rhodesia and India, the article continued: "Full honours for solving the problem goes to the Canadian Boy Scouts, to whom thousands of children throughout the world owe their thanks. They started the Toy Shop Scheme, which is one of the most masterly pieces of good turn organization ever carried out by Scouts."

A Montreal Scout Christmas Toy Repair Shop truck sent out to collect discarded and broken toys carried the large-letter sign, TOY AMBULANCE.

A successful demonstration of Scout cooking skill was pancake supper put on by Rover Scouts of Tillsonburg, Ont. Girl Guides served while the Rover chefs in the Unity hall kitchen worked fast to keep up with the demands of the 100 pancake-hungry guests.

Blind Boy Scouts of the Calcutta Blind School, who are expert gardeners, on their own initiative contribute to the relief of flood sufferers in Bengal. Other troops of the district promptly followed their example, and substantial quantities of food resulted.

Looking to next summer, a houseboat placed at their disposal by the Federal Department of Transport was leased by the Peterborough, Ont., City Council to the local Scout Association as a headquarters for Sea Scouts, at a nominal rental of \$100 per year. The houseboat will be located on near-by Little Lake.

The plan of saving a distressed bather with a 15 pound weight was an idea evolved during rescue tests conducted with Boy Scouts by Prof. T. C. Adams of the University of Utah. The tests were made in Great Salt Lake, and the weights used to keep the supposedly exhausted swimmer "right-end up."
