THE Prohibition case against Wm. Hatherly, North Wiltshire which was up for hearing yesterday has been adjourned till Thursday for judgment.

A Late despatch, received here last night by Wm. Mombourquette, agent of the Flan Lias, stated that the S. S. Halifax had left Halifax last night and will be due in Charlottetown about 10 or 11 o'clock this evening. Storms evidently do not deter the good ship Halifax from carrying out her schedule.

The death of John Bolger, proprietor of the Bellway House, Water Street, an aged and well known citizen, took place last night at his home. He had been unwell for some days. He was a native of Ireland, and a brother of Simon Bolger of this city. He leaves four daughters to mourn.

One of the most regrettable accidents resulting from the storm is the falling of the newly erected wall for the addition to the Prince of Wales College. This fell with a loud crash yesterday morning and rendered vain a vast amount of work which has been expended upon it. An immense pile of brick and stone is now all that remains to tell the tale.

The gale continued with almost unmitigated force all day yesterday, and it was disagreeably rainy all day. During the total period of the storm the rainfall has been about four inches. The gale has been felt all over the Province, and it Cape Breton a wind velocity of sixty miles an hour is reported. Yesterday the S. S. Northumberland left here in the morning for Pictou and made the return trip as usual in the evening, bringing the Nova Scotia mails. The S. S. Empress did not leave Summerside for Pt. Du Chene, consequently there was no mail from the Upper Provinces or the United States last night.

The latest news received from the stranded steamer Turret Bell, ashore at Cable Head, was to the effect that last night she was in shore not more than twenty yards or so from land. The captain got ashore early in the day, but none of the rest of the crew, numbering over twenty, had landed. They are reported to be comfortably situated, and in no danger, although the spray at times was dashing high over the vessel. It is feared that it will be a very difficult task to remove the steamer from her present position, but F. W. Hyndman, senior partner of Hyndman & Co., Lloyd's Agents in this city, is going to the scene this morning, and his report will be conclusive when given.

The storm has played many wild pranks in the country. It was particularly severe on hay barracks, a number of which are reported to have been blown down in various localities. Among others who suffered in this way is Joseph O'Boone, Bonshaw, and at Vernon similar accidents are reported. The gale caused trouble and loss to fishermen at Tracadie among those who suffered loss of gear being Messrs. Fanning, Butler, McKinnon and Watta, whose boats were sunk. The high tide which did more or less damage all around the coast, at Stanhope bodily lifted the lighthouse off its foundation, and moved it back nearly 100 yards. Sail boats at anchor, wherever exposed to the fury of the gale met with more or less injury. A schooner at Murray Harbor S.uth, the Marion Emmerson, dragged her anchor and stranded in South River. She was loaded with potatoes by Horatio Graham and was awaiting an opportunity to sail. She is not injured and is expected to be got off after discharging cargo.

The S. S. Restigouche sails at four o'clock this morning for Sydney and St. John's, with a full outward cargo and a deck load of cattle and sheep.

The news of the recovery of the Rev. James Simpson from his recent indisposition will be learned with general satisfaction. Yesterday he was reported much better.

ACCORDING to the latest issue of the Charlottetown Post Office Guide collections from street letter boxes are made at 6 a. m., 2 p. m. and 3 p. m. It is to be hoped that the collector hasn't waited many years for 30 o'clock to come around.

The long-continued storm and wet weather is having a depressing effect on trade and on everybody and everything else. But better weather is coming and the storm though severe has not been, fortunately marked by any great disasters or loss of life, so far as can be learned from present reports.

The report of the recent tempestuous voyage of the Plant Liner Halifax, from Halifax to Boston, and the tragic death of the carpenter, which appears on page 1 today, will be read with sympathy by readers of this paper. At the same time it will allay the anxiety of several who expected that the vessel had left Boston on Saturday with passengers, some of whom were destined for this port.

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening, Henry Smith the newly appointed member being in his seat. Teachers' reports showed enrolment for the past month to be 1237, the average attendance 1108; the percentage of number cases tardiness 176; truants 10; number of visits by teachers 232; number of notices to parents 77; cases of corporal punishment 10; below average; in grading 47. Mr. Barlow reported the success of Charlottetown's Manual Training School Exhibit at the Dominion Exhibition, where five first-prizes were won. The Board expressed their gratification. It having been brought to the notice of the Board that certain teachers are not in their rooms at the required time and this is frequently caused by loitering in the rooms of other teachers the Board expressed its strong disapproval and will warn these teachers that any repetition will result in the Board being compelled to take strong measures to enforce obedience to its rules, even though this should result in the dispensing with the services of the offenders. It was agreed to open a new department in Queen Square School, owing to the overcrowded state of the Primary classes, and Miss Ralala McDonald was appointed to the position of teacher. Mr. Smith was put on the Discipline committee.
