COINAGE AFTER NEW YEAR

Inscription Will Indicate King Edward's New Title of Sovereignty.

LONDON, Eng., Dec. 13.—Inquiries made at the Mint and the Post Office with reference to the new coinage and the new issue of stamps meet with the answer that no official information can be given yet. The new coinage will not be ready this year. The intention is to issue it as early as possible in the new year. It is just possible that the new stamps may be issued at the same time. There is an expectation that the portrait of His Majesty, both on the stamps and the coins, will be in the nature of a profile, though not a full profile. The inscriptions on the coin will of course, indicate King Edward's title of sovereignty as recently amended. Some years ago there was a suggestion as to whether the florin of half-crown might not be dropped out of circulation, and curiosity now exists whether any change of this sort will be made in connection with the issue of the coinage. Some people appear to fancy that we are, in a day as it were, to bid good-bye to Queen Victoria's money, and have it replaced all round by that bearing the portrait of Edward VII. It is hardly necessary to say that the change will be quite a gradual one. A complete set of King Edward coins have been prepared, but the order of their issue will depend on the call of the banks. No Queen Victoria pennies were issued for a year or two after her Majesty ascended the throne, as a great supply of copper was in existence.

KING EDWARD STAMPS.

As to the King Edward stamps—of which the penny and halfpenny ones are understood to be already printed—the statement is that as few changes as possible have been made; the point being that people have grown familiar with certain colors as representing certain values. Still there undoubtedly will be some changes in the colors of our stamps and the confident view among philatelists is that the new penny one will be red.

At 3.15 yesterday morning an alarm of fire was rung in discovered by Mr. Thomas Merchant, The blaze was located in the building on the corner of Queen and Sydney street, occupied by Messrs. Driscoll and Hornsby Grocers, M. Stevenson, Tinsmith, and the Singer Sewing Machine, Co. When the fireman arrived they found that the fire was in a vacant shop in the building fronting on Sydney street just in the rear of Driscoll & Hornsby's store. For upwards of two hours the fireman fought the flames before they were got under control. First the fire broke out on the southern side of the building, then it crossed northward through the third storey breaking out and communicating with the adjoining building. At 4 o'clock it was necessary to carry the hose to the roof of the building where the fire originated and after a portion of the peak of the adjoining building had been cut away the fire was prevented from spreading further. The block where the fire started is badly gutted. Messrs. Driscoll & Hornsby's stock of groceries in their store is ruined. Their winter's stock in the adjoining building is also greatly damaged by water. Their loss is only partially covered by insurance. The other occupants suffer also from water and smoke. The buildings are owned by Mrs. Jas. McCraith, Boston. It will be remembered that Messrs. Jenkins & Sons were burned out in this block about two years ago. Peculiar to say the fire started yesterday morning near the same place as on that occasion.

That is the color favored by the Postal Union, to which Great Britain belongs for all stamps equivalent in value to a penny; nor would it be a novelty in this country, for most of us remember the reddish Queen's head that preceded the present lilac one. Most of the countries belonging to the Postal Union give effect to this principle, and the view is that Great Britain will now do so. Our halfpenny stamp is green, in accordance with the Postal Union scheme for that value, while our twopence halfpenny stamp comes near the same requirement in being almost blue. The world's postal traffic is mostly carried under stamps of a halfpenny, a penny and twopence-halfpenny, or their equivalents in other coinages. The idea of the Postal Union has been to simplify the handling of this postal traffic by having kindered colors for kindred values. That there will be any changes to speak about it in the more expensive stamps, apart from the new design itself, is not thought to be very likely.

The Dalhousie Gazette in referring to the death Mr. D. J. MacLeod says: Many students, especially the class of '03 have heard with much sorrow of the death of D. J. MacLeod at his home in Valleyfield, P. E. I., on November fourth. Mr. MacLeod had completed his second year in Dalhousie and last summer was employed as a catechist in the Mission Station of Pleasant Bay, C. B. Pleasant Bay will have a melancholy interest for Dalhousians of these years, for it was here that Clarence Grand died but two years ago. His many friends in College will sympathize deeply with his bereaved family in their time of mourning.

DIRECT STEAMER

Dalton Hall Sails Today From Charlottetown

WITH A LARGE CARGO

Of Live Stock, Produce, Fruits and Canned Meats.

Those who visited the Plant Line pier on Saturday evening when the live stock was being placed on board the Dalton Hall must have been impressed with the importance of a direct steamship communication. On Saturday a GUARDIAN representative talked with a number of the shippers and found them delighted with the space allotted to live stock. The sheep are placed in comfortable pens and are practically safe from the action of the sea. The cattle are given quarters where they will be warm and comfortable. The freight offered even at this late trip of the Dalton Hall demonstrates beyond a doubt what is possible for at least four or five sailings in a season, possibly two in the spring and three in the fall. The uncertainty in the past has made it necessary to solicit freight in the present instance, but these in a position to know state that if direct steamship communication was kept up for three years there would be no question as to the amount of produce and live stock that would go forward. In fact it is contended by some that if regular sailings were secured the quantity of freight would increase to such an extent that the steamship owners would be looking for the business even without a subsidy. There is one important feature in connection with direct steamship communication that is not to be lost sight of and that is the absolute necessity of the shippers of this Province standing together and backing up the efforts of those who are trying to furnish the facilities. It is stated that in the present instance shippers had agreed for space, rates, etc., and that they were afterwards quoted a cut rate by other lines whose object was to discourage the promoters in bringing the Dalton Hall to this port. Some shippers look advantage of the cut rates and withdrew unless the Furness Line would meet the cut rates offered. Inconvenience has also been experienced in loading the Dalton Hall owing to her length as there was one of her hatches which could not be used. This is a matter that should be looked into by the Board of Trade at once as the owners of large steamers are unwilling under greatly increased expense, to be hampered in loading or discharging. The promoters are certainly to be congratulated upon the success attained in the securing of freight for the Dalton Hall and we are assured that the encouragement given by shippers will lead to greater efforts in future. Owing to the large amount of live stock offered it was impossible to finish loading on Saturday night. The steamer will sail this morning.
