WHAT CORRESPONDENTS THOUGHT OF MRS. EDDY

The Opinions of the Journalists Who Were Given Audience by Mrs. Eddy at her Home—She is Now in Her 86th Year.

BOSTON, Nov. 2.—Following are brief extracts from various reports of newspaper representatives who were present at the interview yesterday, illustrating the view taken by each:

"The interviewers saw in Mrs. Eddy an encephalated, tottering old woman, who had to cling to the door-jamb to keep herself in an upright position during the brief time she looked into the front parlor, where her callers were assembled, and they saw a woman whose voice was strained and wavering, and whose dimmed eyes, about which there were deep circles, and wrinkles, wandered over the assemblage without giving evidence of distinguishing one person from another.

"In all truth and fairness the appearance of Mrs. Eddy must be summed up as that of a weak, decrepit old woman, extremely weak, and with difficulty controlling her movements, when she tries to walk."

"It was Mr. Eddy at that interview, and Mrs. Eddy is fully able to go driving, but it was plain to everybody that the aged leader is much enfeebled from what she has been. She walked through the doorway to the carriage with assistance, but it was the walk of a very old woman, though she held herself erect. Her arm trembled, and she went with the peculiar, automatic motion of old age. Her face is sunken; the features are sagged by contrast, but her eyes have more than the usual brightness of four-score years.

"It was a trying ordeal to one of her years, but it satisfied everybody that Mr. Eddy is able to get out driving and does go driving. Mrs. Eddy walked to her carriage, but whether she walked down stairs from her room above is not known. The correspondents were in the drawing room of Pleasant View and were unable to see this."

GIRL LIVED ON NUTS IN WOODS

PARIS, Nov. 2.—A little girl, aged nine years, was found by sportsmen wandering in the forests near Brest yesterday.

They discovered she had been living in the woods for several weeks, and made herself a bed of leaves in a small cave. She obtained her food from the hedge-rows, where she picked berries and nuts.

She told the men she had lived at Fraucourt, in the Commune de Saint Elic, and ran away from home because she was mistreated. Her right arm had been broken and having received no medical treatment, had grown crooked.

The sportsmen tried to persuade her to go with them, but she became frightened, and, running away into the woods, disappeared.

The Brest authorities have ordered a search to be made.

A WAR TO KILL TOUGHS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Secretary Bonaparte has received a letter from a resident of Louisiana suggesting that the United States should force "all the United States desperadoes and bad characters generally" into a war with "some vicious nation," in order that the undesirable elements referred to might be killed off.

Secretary Bonaparte, in replying, said that as the correspondent did not give his plan in detail he would not give an opinion on its merits, but he could not attend to the fact that it had been the experience in war that the percentage of desirable citizens killed was larger than the present case of bad characters removed by the casualties of an armed conflict.

TORONTO POLICE CLUBBED THEM

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—There was trouble in the city last night between the police and the university students, and the former were accused of using their batons too freely. An investigation is being made. The trouble started in Jarvis street, where, it is stated, a number of police charged into the rear of a small procession of students who were marching along singing. They used their clubs freely, knocking several boys senseless and challenging every individual they met, whether student or not. Those who were in the procession made quickly towards the university, and met again, singing and shouting, preparatory to breaking up when a number of policemen came out from behind a building and charged them, belaboring them with their batons. One man fell, and it is stated that one of the constables clubbed and kicked him most brutally.

The students went over to the new convention building and armed themselves with sticks and stones, prepared to make a serious attack on the police, but upon being assured that the men injured was not a student, they desisted.

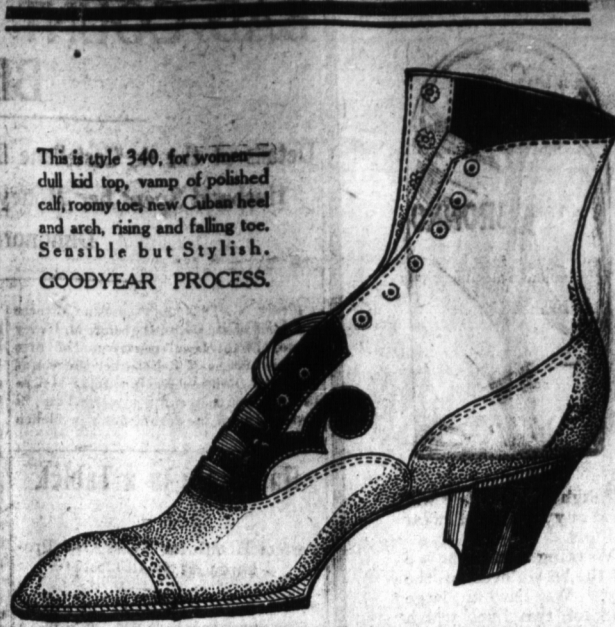

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest NON ESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY unnumbered section of Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, on the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
A homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by the person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of this homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands (Division of Agriculture) for intent.
