**Princess At 90 Gets Thrill In Christmas Shop**

**VICTORIA'S DAUGHTER, LOUISE, SOMETIME OF OTTAWA, TAKES SHARE OF ROYALTY'S DUTIES.**

Princess Louise Duchess of Argyll, though in her 90th year, has taken her share of the task of royalty in opening bazaars and sales that precede Christmas.

(As the wife of the Marquis of Lorne, Princess Louise, a daughter of Queen Victoria, spent her early 30s in Canada as chateleine of Rideau Hall, Ottawa, when her husband was Governor-General of Canada, 1872-78).

At the opening of the Exhibition of British Handicrafts the Princess showed time has in no way dimmed her interest in the arts since the days when she herself excelled as a painter and sculptress. She made a little impromptu speech, then went around and bought Christmas presents at the stalls. It was afterwards remarked she did not forget to give patronage where it encouraged fine artistic effort or might charitably do most good.

One of her purchases was a gay feather mount for a tailored hat made by a woman who raises brightly-plumaged birds in an aviary for this purpose. She also bought two silver brooches of old Scottish design, a finely tooled leather handbag, hand-made lace, a boudoir lamp made by an ex-soldier, scarves woven by crippled girls.

The Exhibition of British Handicrafts is as far removed from the usual bazaar as an art exhibition. Only the cream of the country's handicraft is admitted. To belong to the Home Arts and Industries Association is a distinction of women must submit to a design committee who also pass on the exhibits on each stall at the annual exhibition. The public see only what meets with their approval.

There were no doo-dads or hand-painted sofa cushions but instead hand-made jewellery, hand-printed textiles, hand-made lace, hand-woven tweeds, hand-made gloves, hand-carved woods and modern hand-woven rugs.

Down to the wood block printed five-cent Christmas cards and the hand-made wooden buttons, every item was designed and made by an expert amateur. The work came from every corner of the country and from all classes of people.

**Use Canadian Wood**

From Wales and the distressed mining areas came furniture made in the new workrooms organized by the Society of Friends, where miners' sons are turning out modern furniture in Canadian maple and South African walnut. This furniture is so beautifully proportioned and finished it is ordered by universities for museum pieces as typical of the best of this century.

From Wales also came finely quilted silk bedspreads and dressing gowns made by miners' daughters and wives. This work — done in cottages at mine head — was perfect, though requiring days of fine sewing. The patterns chosen came down from Tudor times and have been treasured in families for generations. The Rural Industries Bureau organized the scheme.

What the judges declared the most outstanding woodwork in the whole British Handicraft Exhibition came from the new Christian Communitarian community of Bruderhof in Wiltshire. Of the same religious belief as the Hutterian community near Winnipeg, members of the Bruderhof left Germany last year because the Nazi Government confiscated their land for a military manoeuvre area. They have taken up farms in the Cotswold hills and have been joined by English converts.

Now they are a brotherhood of nearly 200 people with property held in common and sharing in communal work. They use Empire woods in the craft work and simple useful designs.
