There has been so much said through the press about the relative values of certain Broadcloths, during the last few weeks, that we think a little real information on this subject would be of interest to the public.

**Appearance**

Broadcloth in all the grades that retail up to \$1.95 per yard is, as a rule, a very unsatisfactory cloth in appearance after being worn a few times. The pile is so very long that every bit of dust adheres to the surface with such tenacity that the finish of the cloth is ruined by the amount of brushing required to remove the dust.

**SEDAN CLOTH** is of an entirely different finish, being finer and lighter in weight. It also has the advantage of having a very high finish on a short pile which is not removed when the cloth is sponged. This cloth is a splendid dust shedder.
