### WOMAN AND THE LAND

The more inquiries one makes the more one is convinced that western farming offers great opportunities to the young woman, says a writer in the Toronto Globe. Not far from Edmonton a young lady took a quarter section—one hundred and sixty acres—and is making a remarkable annual income raising thoroughbred chickens. All of the section is in use, either for scientifically planned houses and large runways or for the raising of food for the fowls.

For anyone to whom this work appeals there is a great opportunity for specialization in different breeds. The preparation necessary for such an enterprise would probably include a short course at one of the agricultural colleges. The more funds at one's disposal the larger the start would be, and the greater the immediate returns.

Either the girl herself, or an assistant whom she would need if the work were done on a fairly large scale should be able to shoot, since several of the small prairie animals, which are otherwise objectionable, frequently play havoc in a chicken house.

But given the time, the place and the circumstances it is the acme of luxurious good taste.

### Dress Hints

When cutting a pattern from goods that pull, such as crepe de chine, crepe charmeuse, mousseline, chiffon, mate the material to newspaper or tissue paper and cut out by pattern through paper and material.  
If you have not wire collar supporters with covered ends, work button-hole stitches over them with coarse cotton. This protection saves the lace of a collar and prevents the snaglihty extension of wire over the edge.

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 132-3, instead of 132-2, or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one want will greatly lessen the work of other departments. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions of news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, up stairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone numbers except 132 and 133.
