IN MEMORIAM
MR. JOHN MACKAY

The death of Mr. John McKay of Wood Islands, which occurred very suddenly, on the morning of Nov. 14, 1913, at the advanced age of 75 years, removes one who by his true Christian character won the respect and friendship of all who knew him. In the morning he dressed and appeared to be in his usual health and spoke to his wife and family, who were awaiting him for breakfast. When his wife entered the room she was surprised to see that his eyes had closed in death. The late Mr. McKay in early life was a rugged trader, and was for a number of years in the employ of Welsh & Owen. He was also for a number of years keeper of Wood Island Light House. The blow to his family and friends is severe in its suddenness. His son Walter and daughter Elizabeth on account of not receiving the telegram in time arrived too late to see anything but the new made grave, but they have the comfort of knowing that this departed friend has the blessed assurance of God's favor and the hope of glory in the world to come. The funeral was held on Monday 17, and was largely attended. The service at the house and grave was conducted by the Rev. John Gillis, when all that was mortal of a kind husband and father was laid to rest to await the final resurrection morn.

MRS. WILLIAM STOREY
The subject of the sketch was well advanced in years and had seen the "snows of many winters." She was born Dec. 2nd, 1823, at what is now known as Cherry Valley. Her maiden name was Catherine Douglas Mellich. On February 29th, 1848, she was united in marriage to William Storey of Millview. This union was blessed with eight children, three daughters and four sons. The surviving daughters are—Mrs. Worth, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Christie, Boston. The sons living are H. S. and Thos. F. in New York and Joseph on the homestead. Mrs. Storey united with the Methodist Church, Millview, during the pastorate of Rev. J. Colter, ('85-'87) and remained a consistent and faithful member until her translation on Nov. 15th, 1913. She was of a quiet, kindly and sympathetic disposition which praiseworthy qualities are not lacking in the family she has left to mourn. Her funeral will largely attended thus attesting to the sincere respect of the community in which she lived for so many years.

SOCCER SPREADING VERY RAPIDLY IN UPPER CANADA.

TORONTO, November 28.—That soccer is going to boom next year is evidenced by the preparations being made by the Eastern Football Association, the local professional organization. Arrangements have been made so that the Island Stadium and Scarborough Beach field will be used by the local pro. teams for their games next season. The league which at present includes the two local teams, Toronto and Queen City, and Hamilton City and Hamilton United will branch out and take in two American teams, one representing Buffalo and the other from Rochester. They will play a home and away series, the season starting in May and ending about the end of August, and to be opened about the middle of September. As an extra proof of the ambitious policy of these soccerites, they have arranged for a visit next season of the famous Glasgow Rangers and Blackburn Rovers.

CANADA'S NEW CUSTOMS CRUISER.—Word has been received by the Customs Department at Ottawa, that the new fast cruiser which is being built for the service will be launched at Southampton on December 11. Mrs. Hon. G. H. Perley will be asked to christen the ship which is called the "Margaret," the christian name of the Duchess of Connaught. The cruiser is under contract to be delivered at Halifax at the end of the year. It is a steel twin-screw boat and will be used for patrol service in the Gulf. It is very fast and thoroughly modern and will be armed with two six-pound quick-firing guns. There has been a great deal of smuggling and poaching in the Gulf which it is expected the new boat will put an end to.

CHEMICAL EXTINGUISHER.—In connection with the proposal of the City Council to obtain a chemical fire-extinguisher for the Fire Department of the city, the Council are now in possession of circumstances which may alter their decision. They have been communicated with to the effect that the town of New Glasgow is wishing to sell its latest chemical and hose combination wagon, a machine of the same type that the Council have in view for Charlottetown. It is reported to be comparatively new, and that there is every opportunity of the Council securing a bargain, as the New Glasgow people will sell cheaply. The machine complete cost them \$2,700, and the Charlottetown Council have been informed that they can get it now for \$1,600. The doubt is raised whether the machine was found to be useful or successful in its operation.

PEOPLE'S CHURCH.—The Rev. D. MacLean will preach at Hunter River, Saturday evening at 7.30, Sabbath 30th. Glasgow Road at 10.30 a. m., Highfield 2.30 and in evening 7 p. m.

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH.—Rev. A. J. McLeod, of Denmark, N. S., will occupy the pulpit of Central Christian Church tomorrow, both morning and evening. Mr. McLeod preached two eloquent sermons to this congregation last Sunday and made a most favorable impression. His sermons are evangelistic and intensely earnest. He has been evangelist in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for the past few years and has had marked success in his labors.

GEORGETOWN.—St. David's Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, the Rev. A. J. W. Mack will preach on Sunday, Nov. 30th at 11 a. m., The Sermon in the Supper, and 7 p. m., The same High Over All. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be dispensed at the morning service. On Tuesday, Dec. 2nd, at 8 p. m., the services of the Church will be advocated by the presbytery's Committee appointed to visit the congregation. The Rev. W. Young, of Korea, is expected to present the claims of Foreign Missions, and the Committee, those of Home Missions; both will illustrate with lantern views. All are heartily invited.—A.

DUBLIN, Nov. 29.—Bonar Law addressed an immense meeting in the Theatre Royal here to night and an overflow meeting in the streets. He challenged the Government. He thought they had a moral right to send men to arrest Sir Edward Carson and suppress the armed movement in Ulster. The streets tonight were crowded. Students marched in procession and smashed windows in tram cars and buildings. Some shots were fired and one woman was wounded. The police were kept busy preventing flights of various kinds.

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—The announcement made on Tuesday that Mayor Lavallee was to ask the Dominion authorities to appoint a special commission to inquire into the real way living conditions in Montreal are more onerous than in big American cities, has led to interesting developments. Not only has the board of control unanimously approved of the move, but the mayor stated to-day that he intended, at the meeting of the city council on Monday, to ask that a special civic delegation be appointed to interview the prime minister in regard to the matter. "I feel convinced," said His Worship to-day, "that the Ottawa authorities will not fail to appoint the desired commission. It is almost an abnormal state of affairs when the charge can be made that it is more expensive to live in Montreal than in other large cities on this continent. Such statements cannot but be harmful to the growth and reputation of Montreal. If these statements are true, it is high time that the public should be made aware of what conditions are responsible for it."

THE ENGLISH RACING SEASON.

LONDON, November 28.—The final race run on Saturday in a fog closed an unsatisfactory flat racing season, which was chiefly remarkable for the victories of long priced outsiders in the big events. J. B. Joel, who has won £123,133 in stakes in the past six years, was the most successful owner of the year. The Earl of Derby, who is third this year, has won £106,619 in the past five years. The King won £4,480 in five races. Dan Maher was the most successful jockey, riding 115 winners. Frank Wooding, who has made a fortune and retired from the turf because of over-weight, rode 91 winning mounts and had the best percentage.

MILITARY WEDDING AT QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, November 27.—The marriage of Miss Ethel Atkinson, daughter of the late Henry Atkinson, of Etchemin, and Lieutenant-Colonel R. M. Courtney, of Ottawa, took place at Christ Church, New Liverpool, yesterday. The ceremony was performed by the Very Rev. Dean Williams, of Quebec, assisted by Rev. W. H. Cassap.
