Rangers Close-in On Bruins Defeating Red Wings 4-1; Chihawks Blank Maroons

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 — (CP) — New York Rangers' baffling combination attack brought them a 4-1 win over Detroit Red Wings tonight and drew the blueshirts up three points behind the National Hockey League section-leading Bruins.

The Rangers scored in every period while 13,000 fans watched. Rangers started the scoring, Neil Colville firing the puck into the Detroit cage with the aid of Alex Shibicky and Mac Colville. Bucko McDonald evened the count before the first period ended.

Wings failed to maintain the pace in the second period in which the Rangers took the lead. Bryan Hextall scoring with a quick slash on a pass from Ott Heller.

In the final chapter the Rangers banished two goals which followed breakaways from Detroit power plays. Cecil Dillon, with the help of Clint Smith and Babe Pratt, got one and Phil Watson, on a solo dash rang up the other.

EKE OUT WIN

CHICAGO, Jan. 9—(CP)—Chicago's Black Hawks, shuffling forwards and defencemen back and forth, found the winning formula in the third period tonight and the strangely-assorted outfit squeezed out a 1-0 win over Montreal Maroons. National Hockey League sectional tail-enders.

The victory, on Johnny Gottselig's goal midway through the final session, gave the Hawks a firmer hold on third place in the league's United States section as the last-place Detroit Red Wings dropped a decision to New York Rangers.

About 11,000 fans saw the Hawks, shaken up during the week, display plenty of fight, much of it by rookies Harold Jackson and Virgil Johnson, up from the American Association. It was Johnson's shot that paved the way for Johnny Gottselig's goal, and the youngster got a point on his first N. H. L. night.

Gord Drillon Honoured By Moncton Fans

TORONTO, Jan. 9—Big Gordie Drillon, the National Hockey League's leading point-getter this season and probably the best hockey player ever produced in the Maritime Provinces, drew more than 300 fans from Moncton, N. B., to the Maple Leaf Gardens here last night.

It was "Drillon night" and the Maritimers had travelled more than 800 miles to see their hockey hero play with Toronto Maple Leafs against New York Rangers. They didn't see the speedy left winger figure in any of the goals scored in Toronto's 3-2 victory, but he left the visiting New Brunswickers well satisfied with his performance.

"Gee, Gordie sure has improved since he used to play down in Moncton," one visitor remarked to a friend sitting beside him. Drillon left Moncton five years ago to join a junior team in Toronto. After that he played with senior and amateur outfits here and in the United States before he signed up with the Maple Leafs last year.

Most of the visiting fans, a large percentage of them relatives and personal friends of Drillon, saw their first National League game last night but they acted much the same as the thousands of "veteran" fans who packed the Gardens for the game.

They yelled: "Come on, Gordie. Get into it boy." And they screamed "Let's see you go, Conacher." They joined the crowd in criticizing some plays and players. They were always ready to shout approval of others.

"This doesn't seem any better than those old Maritime league games," one Moncton addict remarked after the game. A little more speed, a little more polish, perhaps, but certainly no more exciting or rugged, he believed. The Maritime Hockey League, noted for its rugged play and the Moncton-Halifax rivalry it produced, had teams that won the Allan Cup, emblematic of Canadian amateur championship, three years in a row. Moncton Hawks won the cup in 1933 and 1934 and Halifax Wolverines took it in 1935.

During the intermission after the first period last night, Mayor W. E. McMonagle of Moncton stepped to centre ice and presented Drillon a gold watch while other players stood lined up for the ceremony.

Among the New Brunswickers and former residents of the province attending the game were Drillon's father, Wesley Drillon, a retired railway fireman, his mother and two sisters, Daisy and Lillian. It was a happy night for them, and proud they were of their Gordie.

Freak Goal Gives Leafs 3-2 Victory Over Rangers; Canucks Trounce Bruins

TORONTO, Jan. 9 — Toronto Maple Leafs widened their sectional lead in the national Hockey League to three points Saturday night with a 3-2 victory over New York Rangers. Dave Kerr, whose goaltending has been outstanding this season, was the goat of the Ranger defeat. As 13,600 fans prepared for overtime, Jimmy Fowler looted a long, low shot at the Ranger cage. To the surprise of the crowd, the Rangers and Leafs the puck rolled through Kerr's skates and into a corner of the net. The freak goal climaxed a hard-fought, fast clash.

It came with only two minutes and two seconds to play in regulation time, after Rangers had wiped out a lead with two fast goals by Cecil Dillon and Neil Colville in the second period and Bill Thomson tied the score with his second tally one minute and 22 seconds after the third period got under way.

For half the game Rangers so outclassed the Leafs that it seemed only a matter of time until they would break down goaler Walter Broda's defences and spoil for the crowd celebration of "Gordie Drillon Night". The game was billed in honor of the ace Leaf winger, who was presented with a gold watch by Mayor W. E. McMonagle of Moncton, N. B., Drillon's birthplace.

RALLY TO WIN

MONTREAL, Jan. 9—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens, showing little respect for the mighty Boston Bruins, spotted the National Hockey League leaders a two-goal lead

last night and then came back with a burst of speed that carried them to a 6-2 victory.

It was an important victory for the Frenchmen, who have not lost to Boston this season, for it moved them into a second-place tie with New York Americans in the Canadian section, three points behind Toronto. Bruins held their five-point lead over New York Rangers in the American division.

The game started poorly for 8,000 Canadian supporters as Bill Cowley and Cooney Weiland gave Boston a two-goal lead in the first 12 minutes. But the Habitués were just getting started and before the first intermission speedy George Mantha and Erbe Siebert had evened the score.

Rod Lorrain sank the winning goal after the second period began as Canadiens continued to set the pace and little Aurel Joliat combined with Johnny Gagnon and Paul Haynes to make it 4-1 10 minutes later.

Tiny Thompson, Boston's veteran netman, was the star of the third session as Canadiens broke loose a dozen times from ineffective Boston gang attacks. The Habitués counted two goals, the first by Toe Blake and the second by Babe Siebert, but Thompson kicked out half a dozen other sure scores as his team-mates left him unprotected.

United States Walker Cup Team Named

NEW YORK, Jan. 9—The United States Golf Association Saturday named a 1938 Walker Cup golf team of nine players and two alternates, to be captained by Francis Ouimet, and adopted a one-year modification of the stymie rule.

The make-up of the team which will meet the British at St. Andrews, Scotland, June 3-4 occasioned little surprise. In addition to Ouimet, Boston veteran who has been a member of each squad since the matches were inaugurated in 1922, the men invited to be on the team were:

Johnny Goodman of Omaha, Neb., National amateur champion; Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., runner-up to Goodman at Portland, Ore., August; Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati, 1936 titleholder and 1937 semi-finalist; Marvin (Bud) Ward of Olympia, Wash.; Reynolds Smith, Dallas, Tex.; Fred Haas, Jr., of New Orleans, intercollegiate champion; Charles Kocsis of Detroit, and Charles R. Yates of Atlanta, Ga.

Named as alternates in case any of the above men decline the invitation or cannot compete were T. Siffert Taylor of New York and Don Moe of Portland, Ore.

The U. S. G. A. executive committee, which reported the team selections to the annual meeting, also drafted the substitute stymie rule, which is to be in effect for one year "as a trial only."

The present rule states that, when the balls are lying on the green within six inches of each other, the one nearer the hole may be lifted. The modification adds that the ball lying nearer the hole also may be lifted if it is within six inches of the hole.

United States Looks Ahead To Olympics

NEW YORK, Jan. 9—Proceeding on the theory that Far Eastern turmoil will subside in time to stage the 1940 Olympic Games in Tokyo, the executive committee of the American Olympic Association Saturday set in motion the machinery for United States participation, at an estimated cost of \$400,000.

Actually it won't be necessary to raise any more than the \$350,000 required to send the American athletic expedition to Berlin in 1936. There's a current balance of \$64,878.92 in American Olympic funds, a circumstance that prompted action today to pro-rate \$5,000 of it among a half dozen groups which paid their own way to Germany. The rest will be the "kitty" for 1940.

Appointment of the hockey group's committee was held in abeyance for what officials described as "cleanup" of existing amateur hockey problems. At the present time, the Eastern United States Amateur League stands suspended by the Amateur Athletic Union, as do the three United States teams playing in the Michigan-Ontario league.

Earl Thomson of the United States naval academy and formerly of Prince Albert, Sask., who competed for Canada in the 1920 Olympics was on the list ratified for the track and field committee. Thomson at one time held the world record for 120-metres hurdles, topping the timers in 14 4-5 seconds when he won the event at the 1920 Olympics at Antwerp.

Desilets May Return Soon To Canadiens

MONTREAL, Jan. 9—(CP)—Joffre (Dizzy) Desilets may be back with Montreal Canadiens before the season is over, manager Cecil Hart of the National Hockey League club indicated last night.

Desilets, who played amateur hockey in Charlottetown and Saint John before turning pro, was sent down to New Haven of the International American League after an apathetic showing in early Canadian games this season.

Hart thinks Desilets is good enough for the N. H. L. however and went to New Haven last night after Canadiens game here to scout the blond wingman. "Dizzy" scored three goals in his team's two weekend games against Philadelphia and if he continues his point getting may soon be seen in a Canadian uniform again.

Record-smashing Victory Scored By San Romani

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 — Archie San Romani, youngest of the United States great millers, shaded Indiana's Doc Lash in a record-smashing 3,000-metre race and Glen Cunningham lost his hold on the 800-metre event as the Knights of Columbus opened the indoor track and field season at the 13th Regiment Armory Saturday night.

Shooting starts in the final 25 yards, San Romani nipped the world's two-mile record holder in the final stride to smash Joe Ray's 15-year-old United States standard by 3 4-5 seconds.

San Romani was clocked in 8:27.4 as compared to Ray's mark of 8:31.2.

Cunningham's bid for his fourth straight victory in 800 failed when the veteran Kansan fell at the last turn while running third. Gene Venke, New York Athletic Club stylist, and second to Cunningham last year, went on to beat Ed Brown of the same club in the good time of 1:55.
