SCHOONER AND SUPPLIES FOR DR. GRENELL

NEW YORK, August 1.—With supplies of all sorts aboard for Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenell, the Labrador missionary, the two-masted schooner George B. Cluett sailed today for St. Anthony's, Labrador. The schooner will carry provisions, clothing and a full medical and surgeon's outfit. It is equipped with two auxiliary engines of 150 horse power and will be manned by a crew of seven, under command of Captain C. Mill. On the way to St. Anthony's the vessel will stop at Boston to take on a party of four men and a woman.

D. A. CAMERON MANITOBA'S NEW GOV.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 1.—D. A. Cameron, a well known business man of this city, was today sworn in as Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, to succeed Sir Daniel McMillan, whose term of office has expired by limitation.

COOK OF SCHR. ETHEL, DROWNED AT CHATHAM

CHATHAM, Aug. 1.—Shortly after 2 o'clock today the body of Allan Currie, aged 27, cook on board the schooner Ethel, of Yarmouth, was found floating in the river at Morrison's Cove, a short distance above town, by Vincent Legere, another member of the crew. It seems that on Saturday night deceased came into town with Harold Patterson, mate of the vessel, and returned on board about 11.30 in his usual health. Next morning the deceased was missing. A search was made of the ship and the shore near by, without any trace being found of him and nothing more was seen of him till the body was found today.

BOURASSA'S PRE-ELECTION MANIFESTO

The situation created by the Premier and the leader of the Opposition is singularly false and difficult, he declares, and it behooves those who are not slaves of party to break down its barriers and to place the fight on larger ground.

PLEADED GUILTY TO SMUGGLING

HALIFAX, Aug. 2.—Some time ago the customs officials seized the schooner Condon at Chezzetcook. The case came before Stipendiary Magistrate Macdougall and McDonald yesterday afternoon. Captain George C. Julian and his son John C. Julian were both charged with smuggling. At first they pleaded not guilty, and later on the court was adjourned in order that two witnesses who were missing might be produced. Before the Magistrate left the court house, however, word was sent in that the men accused were prepared to plead guilty. The court re-convened, the plea of guilty was entered, and both men were fined \$50 or one month's imprisonment—the minimum penalty. The fines were paid.

CONDOR AND HER CONTRABAND CARGO OF RUM AND GIN, VALUED AT \$150,000, SEIZED

BOYS AND YOUNG RECRUITS

Admiral Kingsmill, who commands the Canadian navy, and is here from Ottawa, was seen last evening by The Halifax Herald. He paid a warm compliment to the discipline on board the Niobe when she was ashore on the South West ledge. Admiral Kingsmill based what he said on a letter received yesterday from the Niobe by the boys and young recruits. Admiral Kingsmill observed, "I was everything that one could wish. With the ship in the position she was, a gale of wind blowing and a dense fog, the Canadian boys behaved fully up to the traditions of the British navy. The discipline left nothing to be desired. Of course, the ship's crew and officers displayed fine discipline, but I am speaking now of the Canadian boys and recruits." He added, "There was not the slightest panic on board."

YESTERDAY MORNING WHEN THE MEN LEFT CHARL'S HARBOR FOR HALIFAX

Yesterday morning when the men left Char's Harbor for Halifax it was a beautiful day, clear and bright, but no one would think of moving a ship in the Niobe's terrible condition. Of the 190 boys and recruits who came to Halifax last night, about 150 belong to the upper provinces, some going as far west as Port Arthur. They leave this morning and are furnished with free transportation, a month and a half's pay and they have three weeks' leave of absence.
