THE INFURIATED DUKES.

The columns of the British newspapers show that the political temperature is rising rapidly. The excitement could scarcely reach a higher pitch if the country were in the midst of an election campaign says the London Advertiser. Many elections have been fought with much less disturbance. Hundreds of meetings are held daily, and a flood of oratory is sweeping over the land. The speeches by the Prime Minister and leader of the Opposition at Birmingham have been regarded trumpet-calls to the battle which is now believed to be inevitable.

It cannot be said that the Dukes, who figure so largely in the furor over the Budget, are elevating the tone of public discussion. The Duke of Rutland, speaking to West Derbyshire Unionists the other day, characterized Mr Churchill as "a wild and brutal Socialist." He referred to the Government as "the pirate crew of political tatterdemalions who were trying to bring in Socialism under the ensign of that older Liberalism which they had so foully defaced." The noble Duke went on to say that if he had the power he would gag every labor member of Parliament. His speech is an example of the fury of the great landlords, and the majority of the Peers. They have placed themselves in a humiliating and critical position. At the outset their accredited spokesmen definitely declared that the Budget would be thrown back into the Government's teeth by the House of Lords. They were not then conscious of its amazing popularity. Now they find themselves compelled to take either horn of a dilemma—an ignominious backdown, or the forcing of an election in which the Liberals would again sweep the country, and at the same time sweep away the veto of the Upper Chamber.

Returns of Fourth of July casualties in the United States are now fairly complete. The mortality list for 1909, as given in the Journal of the American Medical Association, is longer than that of any year since the bloody slaughter of 1903, when four hundred and sixty six lives were sacrificed. Thus far, two hundred and fifteen deaths have resulted from the last Fourth of July celebration. Illinois had the most deaths, a prominence which it has held for five consecutive years. It had no fewer than twenty tetanus fatalities. Besides its death list, it presents five hundred and forty seven cases of non-fatal injuries.

COW TESTING ASSOCIATIONS.

The experience of one member of a cow testing association is worth recording as showing the necessity of testing as well as weighing milk. His principal income is from selling cream, so that his astonishment may be guessed when he finds this year that the milk from a twelve-year-old cow, that he raised on his farm and fondly imagined one of his best cows, has never tested more than 2.9 per cent of fat. The discovery comes somewhat late to a man who has been harbouring a cow that for a productive period of ten long years has been masquerading as an animal producing fairly rich milk. The cow never gives this information concerning herself voluntarily; it has to be sought for and ascertained by definite and regular sampling. All real improvement of dairy herds includes systematic weighing and sampling of the milk from each cow in the herd. All the herd tests, simply average results, that a man likes to have made will never detect the poorest cow or give due credit to the best cow. There must be testing of individual samples.

ON A BUSINESS BASIS.

Announcements by the Wrights of a purpose to devote their time and attention to the business of building aeroplanes and to instruction in their use is coincident with the return from Europe of Charles R. Fiint, announcing the establishment of several aeroplane factories in Europe and the purpose to incorporate a manufacturing company in this country. These incidents mark the rapid development of aviation and the transit from the stage of demonstration to that of utilization, says the Boston Herald. The world has now been convinced that men can fly, and now is eager for the means to utilize the new device. Experience with other great inventions has demonstrated that actual utilization is the greatest incentive and opportunity for improvement and progress toward ultimate perfection.

COW TESTING ASSOCIATIONS.

From records being received at Ottawa from members of cow testing

associations there is apparent a very marked variation in the earning power of the various cows in the same herd. There is every indication of many of last season's variations being repeated, such totals will show in many cases twenty five dollars difference in income between two cows in the same herd. In some herds this is increased to forty dollars. For instance, in a herd of eleven cows an eight year old cow gives actually four thousand two hundred lbs milk and one hundred and eighty lbs fat more than a five year old in the same stable during the same time. Placing a value of only twenty cents per pound on the butter, the one cow is thus seen to earn over forty dollars more than the other.

This is the important point to notice; there are hundreds of farmers in the Dominion in whose herds just such remarkable differences between cows can be found, but the owners are probably unaware of the extent of such differences and will continue to be without the information so essential in these days of close margins until a record is kept of the production of each individual cow in the herd. A few minutes figuring per month will add vastly to the interest of the daily milking, besides providing a sure guide for rearing more profit per cow. The keeping of such records may have a special attraction for some younger members of the family.

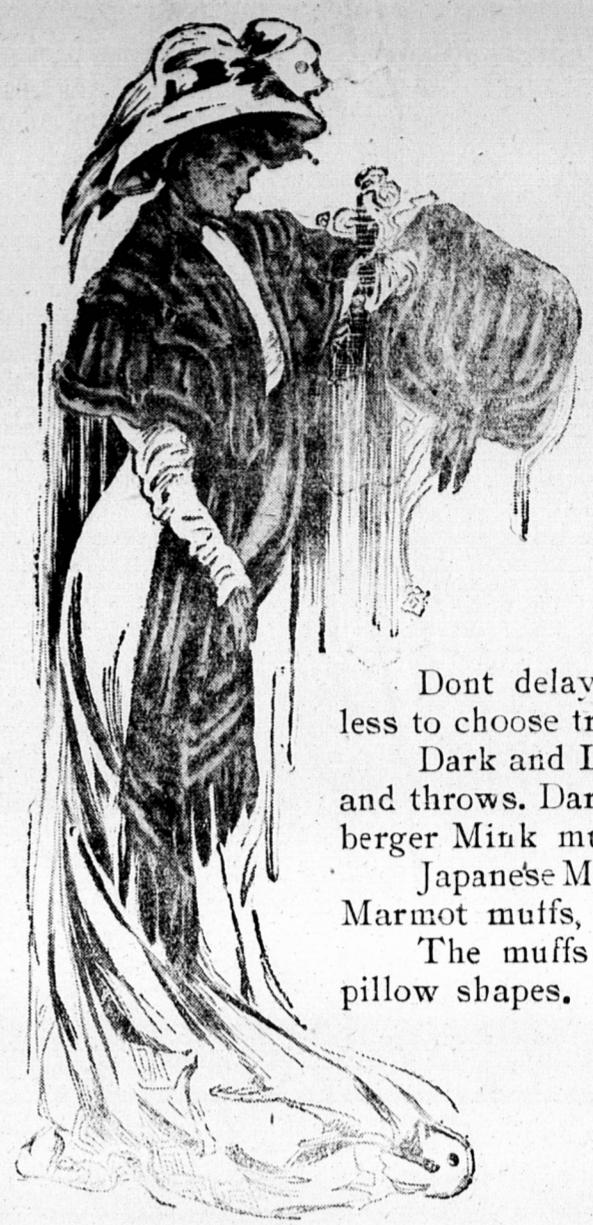
