PROPHETS DECLARE MARRIAGE WILL SOON CEASE TO EXIST

But Human Nature Indicates These Gloomy Persons Are Wrong

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—As an institution wedlock is in its decadence, irrespective of your well-meaning column trying to repair the rifts in the chimeras. It is sad but true that marriage is going streamlined with the consequences which go with it.

ANSWER—I know that many people believe with you that marriage is passing into what Mr. Cleveland called "innocuous desuetude" and that in a few more years it will have become just one of the quaint old customs of which people will tell their children—if the Government isn't rearing all the children by that time—when they get out the family album and show the picture of Great Grandmother in the queer conglomeration of white satin and orange blossoms and veil that they used to call a wedding dress.

Perhaps more so; for whereas in the past a man felt that he had to put off marrying until he could support a wife, now he rushes to the altar with Georgianna and lets her support him if he loses his job. Wives are no longer a liability; they are an asset. Hence more desirable.

Heaven knows marriage is full of imperfections, from whatever angle you regard it. It is jam-packed with injustices, with incongruities, with all sorts of faults and weaknesses, but for all of that it is the best solution of the relationship of the sexes that the ingenuity of man has ever been able to work out. It doesn't always bring happiness, but only a daily miracle would keep any two people who had to live together from getting on each other's nerves.

The very possessiveness of human nature makes me believe that marriage will never cease to exist. Each of us wants somebody who belongs exclusively to us and to whom we belong. We want the privacy of our own homes. We want a place in which to rear our children, and this we can secure only by subscribing to some established ritual such as marriage.

When be abolish marriage we abolish civilization. And we are not ready for that yet.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—Our daughter, who is now 16, ran away and married when she was only 15. The boy she married was from a family far beneath her in every way and although they have been married a year he hasn't even attempted to find any kind of work. He seems to be perfectly happy and satisfied to live on us. He has no education, no morals, no character and his reputation is very bad.

He is dragging our daughter down to his level, but she seems infatuated with him and more determined to continue living with him and more bitter toward us all the time. She resents everything we say about him, and seems almost to hate us, although we have been the most devoted of parents to her. The situation is breaking our hearts. What can we do?

ANSWER—Your daughter's attitude toward you is the result of her humiliation at the situation in which she finds herself and her passionate bitterness against the man who has chosen for a husband. She is bitterly ashamed of her being such a fool and has a contempt for the man who marries and settles down on his wife's people to support him, and it simply burns her up.

She is bitterly unhappy, and she is taking out her unhappiness on you. She heaps on you the abuse she'd like to give her husband. She sticks to him because she's too proud to admit her mistake. She gives you ingratitude for all your kindness because it's killing her that she has to be dependent on you and that her husband is so lazy and trifling he won't even make an effort to support her.

The best thing for you to do under the circumstances is to send the young man packing. Tell him that you will support your daughter, but you won't support him. That will rouse the manhood in him, if he has any.

If you haven't the courage to do this, put them on their own. Give them a small allowance and let them work out their own salvation. There's not much that you can do to save a headstrong girl from having to pay the price of her determination to do as she pleases regardless of how it will hurt others. She has to learn her lesson from experience. But it's a pity that her parents have to suffer with her.

It was illegal for a consumer to stock up or quantities of any goods, beyond an amount reasonably required for the use of the household.

Q. Is a person liable to charges of hoarding on unrationed commodities? A. Yes, a doctor's certificate must be obtained and applied for made for a special permit at the nearest Ration Office.

Q. What regulations are there to prevent a merchant from opening a new store under a different name and charging higher prices? A. A merchant who opens a new business is required to use the basic period selling prices of his nearest competitors. If the merchant is merely opening up a branch of his original store in the same neighborhood, he would be required to use the basic prices of that store as his ceiling. If he closed down for a short interval and opened up again he would be required to use the ceiling prices of the original store.

Q. Is the price of all meats controlled or only that of beef? A. No meat of any kind is exempt from the price ceiling. Pork is controlled by the basic prices of September 15th to October 11th, 1941, and lamb by the prices prevailing in the corresponding season of last year.

ABOUT YOUR RATION CARD Keep your ration card as carefully as you do your money. A ration card lost through carelessness will not be easily replaced and in the meantime there will be no sugar for your household.

THE COOK'S CORNER

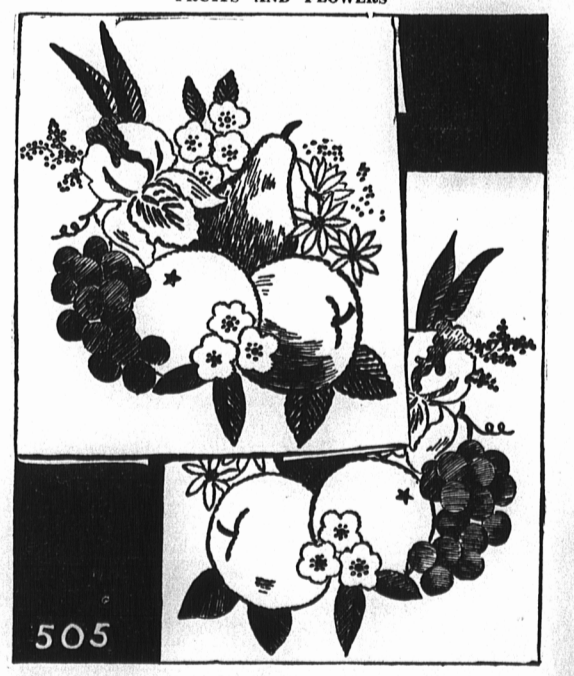
Yeast: Save 1 quart potato water add one medium sized potato, well mashed, 3-4 cup white sugar. When cool add one yeast cake. If one time to time and kept in a cool place it will take the place of a yeast cake. But a yeast cake should be added once a month to strength, etc.

RASPBERRY SHORTCAKE 2 cups sifted flour 1-2 teaspoons baking powder 1-2 teaspoons salt 2 tablespoons sugar 1-2 cup bran 1-2 cup shortening 1 egg 2-3 cup milk Method: Sift the flour, then measure and sift again with the baking powder, salt and sugar. Add the bran and mix together thoroughly. Add the shortening and cut this until the mixture is in fine crumbs. Beat the egg and add to the milk. Add the liquid ingredients to the dry mixture and stir to a soft dough. Divide the batter in two and fit each loosely into an 8-inch greased cake pan. Bake in a hot oven (400 deg. F.) for about 20 minutes. Put the two layers together with sweetened raspberries and top with tufts of whipped cream.
