SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

Papyristite, the wood-pulp artineia stone of Fr. Gehre of Zurich, is very hard and light in weight. It is a non-conductor of heat and noise, is inexpensive, and is especially intended for roofs and floors, although it may be expected to prove useful for other purposes.

Comparing the records for fifty-one years (1841-1891), Mr. A. B. MacDowd all finds that the temperature of both Greenwich and Chicago was above the average during 16 winters, and below during 14. There were nine seasons in which Greenwich was warmer and Chicago colder than the average; and 12 in which Greenwich was colder and Chicago warmer.

An interesting rule for determining the probability of life is stated by M. Schooling of Brussels, to have been worked out by De Moivre, a French mathematician who removed to England in 1865. It is simply necessary to subtract one's age from 86, and to divide the remainder by 2, the result being the number of years one is likely to live. The chance of living one year beyond one's present age is found by M. Schooling to be 5 to 1 at birth, 119 to 1 at 5 years, 512 to 1 at 10 years, 347 to 1 at 15 years, 207 to 1 at 20 years, 120 to 1 at 30 years, and 78 to 1 at 40. Of 1000 persons of 60 years, 599 will live to 70 years, 120 to 80, and 17 to 90.

A new industry for Australia is promised by the valuable Eucalyptus or blue gum tree. An explosive which has been named kaltenite is made from the leaves, and this is said to have five or six times the strength of dynamite, and to be inexpensive to manufacture. If further experience justifies the claims made, the new material may be expected to become one of Australia's important exports.

A remarkable account of the vitality of disease germs comes from Switzerland. In the Haarlem epidemic of 1660, a family of plague victims was buried in the Haarlem church, and the vault containing the bodies was opened thirty or forty years ago by some masons repairing the building. The workmen were all attacked with the infectious glandular swelling, although not with the severest form of the plague.

The principal supply of mica comes from mines in Bengal. These, says Mr. A. Mervin Smith, have been operated from a very ancient period, tea mica being still—as for centuries—only taken out from open cuts in the decomposed granite, new places being sought when the solid rock is reached. Large fires are built to aid in the work. The consumption of mica is now increasing, but seems to have been greater at an earlier time, as the output of these mines was estimated at about 3,700 tons in 1849 and only about 1,000 tons in 1895. The prices of the mica range from \$5.00 to 3 or 4 cents per pound.

ARTISTS LIFE EBBING.

Michael Munkacsy Dying in Insane Asylum.

Berlin, March 23.—Michael Munkacsy, the famous Hungarian painter, who has been secured in a hospital for the insane for several years, is dying.

M. Munkacsy, who was born near Munkacsy, Hungary, October 10, 1844, had been virtually blind to the world since the paralytic shock, which in the latter part of 1896, compelled him to abandon all hope of ever working as his easel again. For months he sat brooding and melancholy until, in an excess of madness, he suddenly attacked and nearly strangled his attendant, and his physician. He was immediately removed to an insane asylum from which he was removed to the retreat where he has just passed away. His parents were poor and before he was seven years old he was left orphan and given over to the charge of an uncle at Joaba, who seems to have treated him very harshly. In the same village his sister was quarrelled and the boy lived between the two houses.

Munkacsy was at his aunt's home one day when brigands entered, knocking down his aunt and bound the whole household—eight people—hand and foot. The aunt was compelled to go around and show them where everything was kept. She died shortly afterwards and Munkacsy to the last day of his rational life, always referred to the experience as one that has biased his whole artistic career, particularly as it affected his dramatic instinct. The youngster was then apprenticed to a tradesman. At 14 he was a qualified workman, and was sent by his uncle to the world with five florins in his pocket. In 1870 he arrived in Paris not knowing a word of French, with a picture that he carried to the salon with his own hands. It was the success of the year, "The Last Day of a Condemned Prisoner," and immediately established his reputation. This was followed by "The Night Prowlers," "The Studio," "The two Families," "Milton Dictating Paradise Lost," "The Daughters," "Christ Before Pilate," "Christ on Calvary" and "The Last Moments of Mozart." One of his greatest paintings "Christ before Pilate" was purchased by John Wanamaker, of Philadelphia, after it had been
