Myrick & Co. for which they paid the sum of \$50.45. The increase during that time, consisted of 2 litters, which were disposed of at 6 and 7 months old, and realized \$230.00 a total of \$280.45.

THE Stanley arrived at 10.15 a. m. Monday with 250 bbls flour, 4 cars mixed freight, 61 bags mill and 9 passengers. The cargo of the S. S. Minto to Picton was as follows: 87 dressed hogs, 42 pkgs beef and mutton, 18 bbls of meat, 43 cans eggs, 21 pkgs butter and lard, 25,00 bush oats, 11 pigs leather, 230 pkgs cordage 10 bags seed, and a quantity sundries. There were 20 mail bags and 10 passengers.
