CHAMBERLAIN HITS Film "Dawn" With Determination

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Sir Austen Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, who has been severely criticized in the quarters for his action in connection with the film "Dawn," depicting the life and execution by the Germans in Belgium of the English nurse Edith Cavell, declared himself in the House of Commons today as quite unrepentant, and ready to take the same course again. Sir Austen made a full disclosure of the motive which actuated him in his efforts to prevent the exhibition of the film. The Secretary frankly declared that as an English gentleman, meaning not in his official capacity, he considered the film an outrage on humanity. Repeating details of the particular scene of the execution as it had been described to him—one soldier refusing to point his rifle, and being himself shot down, the other members of the firing squad leveling their rifles at his head, the nurse falling in a faint and being despatched by a German officer—he deemed it to be wholly improper. He felt it was an outrage on a noble woman's memory to turn to purposes of commercial profit so heroic a story.

Replying to a hot fire of questions intended to reproach him for judging without seeing the film, he scornfully declared he had no intention of seeing it. The Foreign Secretary further remarked that the account given to him of the film version of Miss Cavell's death, "appeared to be inherently incredible, and certainly, on my information, it is incorrect."

In Memoriam

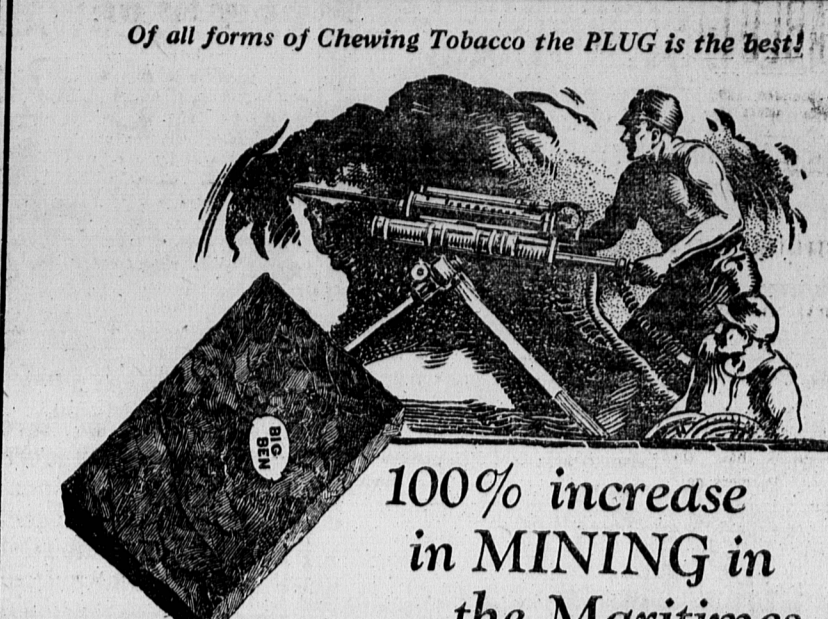
CHAS. GORDON MacDOUGALL (Moncton Transcript, Feb. 9)

Charles Gordon MacDougall, formerly of this city, died on Tuesday in the Shaughnessy Military hospital, Vancouver. His death followed upon shattered health resulting from the Great War. The late Mr. MacDougall was well known in Moncton and throughout the province some years ago, having graduated in Arts from Mount Allison University with the class of '11. He was prominent in athletics as a member of the Varsity football and hockey teams. Later he graduated in electrical engineering from McGill University and on the outbreak of war, enlisted and went overseas with the first Canadian contingent. He served in France with the 8th Field Battery, under Colonel S. B. Anderson. His services were marked with distinction and he was decorated with the D.C.M. for valor in the battle of Pelebert. Later in the war Mr. MacDougall was severely wounded from the effects of which he never recovered and on his return to Canada had been confined to the hospital for the greater part of the time.

The late Mr. MacDougall was 35 years of age and was a son of the late Fulton MacDougall, for years manager of the Royal Bank in this city. His passing will cause sincere regret to this city among those who were acquainted with him. He leaves two brothers, Arthur of Toronto and Jack of Vancouver, and two aunts of this city, the Misses Jessie and Hannah MacDougall.

Interment will take place today in Mountain View cemetery, Vancouver.

The late Mr. MacDougall was a grandson of the late Hon. John Adam Dawson, ex-M.P., and was well known in Pictou, having visited his aunt, Mrs. A. Scott Dawson, two years ago.—Pictou Advocate, February 17.

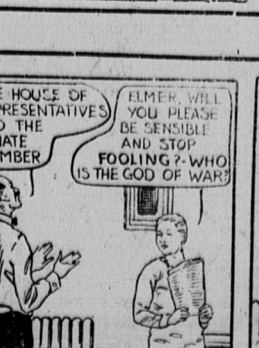
