BOSTON, MASS., May 19.—A twenty-five and a half inch mackerel weighing more than seven pounds was the prize catch of the first mackerel boat to land at this port this season.

The schooner Fanny Powell, Captain Benjamin Fazazza, raced into port May 13 with 1200 pounds of mackerel caught off the Jersey Coast, near Fire Island, Captain Fazazza reported that the fish were plentiful there and predicted a prosperous season.

The Fanny Powell was out of port only two and a half days.
