Monroe Doctrine Discussed. (By ANDRUE BERDING Associated Press Foreign Staff) LIMA, Dec. 15.—(AP)—A pan American Monroe doctrine under which all republics of the western hemisphere would assume the burden thus far maintained by the United States alone came before the pan-American conference today. Foreign Minister Luis Lopez De Mesa of Colombia told the committee for organization of peace that the "Monroe doctrine can now be widened to embrace all free American as a matter of responsibility."
