IVORY CRUCIFIX, FOUND TO BE RARE ART PIECE

MADRID, Jan. 15.—A beautiful carved ivory crucifix, which was purchased for the sum of \$10 at a rag fare in Rouss, Catalonia, twenty-five years ago, has been discovered to be one of the finest carvings of Leonardo da Vinci.

Ten years ago the purchaser left this crucifix with other possessions to her daughter, wife of a deputy, Senor Mayner. No great value had been attached to the object, except a souvenir, until some weeks ago, when a person who was visiting the house offered \$500 for it.

Senora Mayner refused to sell, and she also rejected a further offer of \$75,000 from an antiquarian who had heard of the incident and examined the crucifix. A third offer of \$125,000 is now said to have been received from an American collector.

—A special meeting of the Town Council was held on Saturday evening. The resignation of Policeman Phillips, to take effect at the end of January, was accepted, and Bradford Gough and Albert Gales were appointed policemen at \$50 a month. Policeman Steele had his pay advanced to \$50 and Phillips was \$40 a month, making the total \$960 for the year. The yearly payroll for the police force after this will be \$1800.—S-Side Exc.

—In the Summerside Police Court during the past year 164 charges were disposed of, 88 of which resulted in convictions. There were 16 charges of violation of the Prohibition Act, out of which 14 were convictions; 50 convictions for drunkenness out of 51 charges; 20 charges of disorderly conduct; 15 resulted in convictions; 6 convictions for common assault out of 8 complaints; 4 persons convicted for throwing stones on street and one dismissed two persons fined for disorderly driving and vagrancy. The police register shows that four persons sought lodging in the station during the year, 14 electric lights reported out; 14 alarms sounded; 30 cows and 5 horses were broken; 6 windows were broken, and four dangerous holes in the sidewalk were noted.—S.

ESTATE WILL GO TO WIDOW AND CHILDREN

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—"Even if a doubt existed as to the legality of the marriage I should feel bound to declare in favor of the alleged marriage," says Mr. Justice Latchford, in his finding of fact in the dispute between the brothers and sisters of the late Captain William A. Forbes of Windsor, and his widow and children.

The point necessary to establish the widow's claim to the property was the proof of her marriage, and this was made difficult by the fact that the certificate had been thrown out of the window in a job thrown during a fire and the box had been stolen or lost. Forbes who was then a mate on a ferry which plied between Detroit and Windsor, after midnight on May 22, 1878, rowed his sweetheart who was just 14 years old, across the river in the company of a companion named King and a lady friend. The quartette went to the house of a Justice of Peace, and Forbes and the girl were married. They did not immediately live together, but Forbes kept her at a hotel and at the same time lived with his mother and her children and supported them. The widow and children will get the estate.

BRITISH SHIPBUILDING

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Statistics of British shipbuilding just published announce that the total tonnage of vessels built in 1911 was 2,042,928 tons. This is the largest total for any one year in the history of shipbuilding. At the head of the list of British shipbuilders for the year stands Messrs. Swan, Hunter, and Wigham, Richardson, Ltd., of Wallsend, who built during the past twelve months 125,950 tons of shipping.

This is the largest output for any one firm that has ever been reached, although this firm built the largest tonnage in 1906, when they built the "Mauretania" for their tonnage are several ships built for Canada for their Canadian representative, Mr. Clarence I. de Sola, of Montreal, for the Canadian Pacific Steamship Line, and others. The second place in the record of British shipbuilding during 1911 is held by Messrs. Harland and Wolff, and following them in order of output are: Duxford & Sons, of Sunderland; Gray & Company, of Herringhills; and Armstrongs, Whitworth & Company, of Elswick.

25 CANADIAN MISSIONARIES RAN GAUNTLET

MONTREAL, Jan. 13.—The thrilling adventures of twenty-five Canadian Methodist missionaries in the flight through the heart of the Chinese rebellion is related in a cable to the Herald today from T. E. Plewman of the Canadian Missionary Printing Press at Cheng Tu.

Making their way past desolated and ruined towns, the party, says Mr. Plewman, did not complete the running of the gauntlet from within sight of the mountains of Tibet to the Pacific coasts without being in peril from both government and rebel forces.

"At Hokiang we were fired upon repeatedly by imperial troops and time and again our household was struck, but we escaped unharmed. Only one of the native boatmen was seriously wounded. Several of us 'Canadians' had almost miraculous escapes.

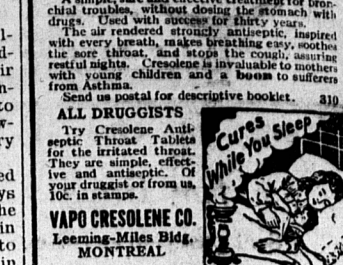
"We did not leave Cheng tu until we were ordered to do so by British consul general. On Dec. 12 we set forth under escort from Chengtu. There were 150 of us in all, composed of nearly ninety members of the Canadian Methodist mission, including the numerous children and their mothers, besides our forty Japanese and persons of four other nationalities.

"The first part of the journey, we made over land. Then we reached deeper water and took the house boats, splitting up into a number of different parties.

"Two miles above Hokiang we reached the British gunboat Widgeon and experienced a great sense of relief. 'We are safe now,' we thought, 'but to our surprise the captain refused to afford us any protection. He turned a deaf ear to our appeals. He sent us on down the river through a district that for hundreds of miles was infested with marauders and full of peril. Had the gunboat been with us it is altogether unlikely that we should have been fired upon as we were. Much indignation is felt among our party and the British officials elsewhere, who have been doing their utmost to protect the foreigners, are making a strong protest to Admiral Sir Aldred L. Winslow, commander in chief of the British eastern fleet, and the matter has been brought to the attention of the British consul.
