Red Sox Likely To Enter Series As Heavy Favorites

(This is the first of a series comparing the clubs which will meet in the 1946 World Series.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP)—This time next week, barring the possibility of a play-off in the National League, either the Brooklyn Dodgers or St. Louis Cardinals will be preparing to grapple with Boston Red Sox in the first game of the World Series.

Whichever club squeaks through in the senior circuit, the Red Sox are certain to enter the baseball classic as heavy favorites, largely because they have Ted Williams and Dom DiMaggio two of the greatest outfielders in the game today.

The Cards could have made it at least stand-off if Stan Musial had not been shifted to the infield, for they have in Snos (Country) Slaughter a star right-fielder who is leading the National League in runs driven in, and who, in fact, has knocked more whiffs across than Williams has.

Likewise, the Dodgers could have come close to providing a man for the two Red Sox pitchers if Pete Reiser, outstanding outfielder, had not developed the miseries in one leg. He and the veteran Fred (Dixie) Walker can make a pitcher run and hide when they team up. But Pete has been of little use in the hot dog drive and cannot be counted upon for the big series.

That leaves Williams, probably the best fielder in the game today, and DiMaggio, close to being the game's finest fielding artist in full possession of the four corners of the diamond. The American League in runs scored and runs batted in, is battling with Hank Greenberg for the homerun leadership and is second in batting.

It will be interesting to see whether the winning National League pilot resorts to the league precedent of switching all of his entire team to the right side of the diamond. Williams comes to bat. Williams' stick average has fallen off considerably since he began using unorthodox defensive formations against him.

Williams and DiMaggio hogging the headlines, the third Sox outfielder has been more or less the forgotten man. In fact, the veteran Ed Stovall, who has pitched against right-hand pitching, Leon Culberson and Tom McBride to face southpaws.

Greenberg Slams Three Homers As Tigers Run Winning Streak To Ten

(By The Canadian Press) Stretching their longest winning streak of the year to 10 straight games, Detroit Tigers slapped St. Louis Browns 4-3 and 10-1 to sweep a twin bill yesterday as Hank Greenberg clouted three homers to grab the American League lead with 41.

The double victory clinched the runner-up berth for the Tigers, 1946 champions. Greenberg's 39th homer, which put him one-up on Ted Williams in their terrific race for the slugger championship, broke up the first game after one was won in the Detroit ninth and brought Freddie Hutchinson his 14th win.

Two more drives into the lead in the 40-minute game were made by the 40-year-old slugger in the eighth and ninth innings. Roy Cullenbine and Dizzy Trout also homered in the nightcap as Trout scattered five hits for his 17th pitching triumph.

In addition to going three ahead yesterday, the homer derby Greenberg drove across five Detroit runs in the two games to stretch his total to 126, just one behind Ted in the R.B.I. department.

The pennant-winning Boston Red Sox ended whatever chances New York Yankees had of finishing in second place in the American League by noosing out the Yanks 5-4.

The third-place Yanks now trail the runner-up Detroit Tigers by more than four games and have only four left to play while the Bengals have five.
