—K. OF C. CONVENTION.—Hon. A. F. Arsenault, Summerside, State Deputy of the Knights of Columbus for P. E. I., returned home Saturday night after attending a convention of the state deputies of the order held in Edmonton.

—POLICE COURT.—At the police court in Summerside Monday one drunk was fined \$2 and costs. A prohibition case was adjourned till Saturday. A case against a citizen, under the Customs Act, was heard and adjourned until Monday.

—GO TO OTTAWA.—Senator and Mrs. MacArthur and their two daughters left Saturday for Ottawa and have closed their home in Summerside for the term of the present session. They will attend the reception to the Governor General and spend a few days in Montreal en route.

—ICE GOOD.—Ice men, who did not get their full supply at the time the first crop was taken up are now stocking up for the summer with the second crop, this ice is about 16 inches thick and is of excellent quality being hauled from the pond up the West end of the town. H.

—ON DIRECTORATE.—Messrs. Sanford Phillips of O'Leary and Alfred Simpson, of North St. Eleanor have been appointed as members of the directorate of the British-Canadian Packing Co., Saint John, N. B. The new directorate consists of fourteen members, twelve elected and two named by the N. B. Government.

—WEDDING BELLS.—At the Rectory, Summerside, on Tuesday, February 8th, by the Rev. Mr. White, Carrie Alice Stewart, daughter of Mrs. David Stewart of Northam, was united in marriage to Mr. Aulton LeRoy Ellis, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Ellis of East Blenheim. Previous to her marriage Miss Stewart was tendered a miscellaneous shower at her home and was the recipient of many gifts which showed the high esteem in which she was held by her friends. Lunch was served to over eighty people and a very enjoyable evening was spent in music, games, etc., after which they all dispersed to their homes thinking they had a jolly good time.

—POLICE COURT.—On Saturday morning at the Prince County Court house, Judge McQuarrie presiding, a man from West Prince County charged with an offence against the Prohibition Act appeared for trial, a conviction was obtained and a fine of \$200.00 and costs imposed or a three month term in jail, he took the latter and was locked in jail. Two other men from a nearby village who had also been summoned to appear on a somewhat similar offence, confessed to the charge and each fined \$200.00 and costs or three months in jail. All the informations were laid by Chief Prohibition Inspector Barbour. H.

—MOVING PICTURES.—Pictures beautifully descriptive of Canada, were shown in the Strand theatre, Kensington, last week, and were specially intended for the instruction of school children. The pupils of the surrounding districts, as well as those of Kensington were present en masse and they enjoyed the event to their hearts content. The pictures were secured from the Dept. of the Interior and loaned by Hon. A. E. McLean, presentation, and the pupil parents and teachers showed their appreciation by attending in large numbers and by following the show with closest interest. The managers of the theatre and the operators of the machine rendered excellent service, and the audience displayed their appreciation by a unanimous vote of thanks. This was duly acknowledged by Mr. T. N. Donohoe, manager of the theatre. A hearty vote of thanks was also enthusiastically passed to Hon. A. E. McLean. Y.

—TOWN COUNCIL.—The final meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday night. It was decided to purchase a siren whistle for the fire alarm at a cost of \$413.20. The usual reports were submitted and the usual election appointments made. **CONDITIONS IN MONTREAL**

Sir,—I see that there is unemployment and hardship in Montreal, on the part of many persons, and that appeal for health to those who are well off are made. I saw in one of the Montreal papers the photograph of a procession of hundreds of men, mostly young, waiting for admission to "a place of refuge" where they might get a cold bed at night and a warm cup of coffee in the morning. I read in the same paper a report that "the other day a sixty-year-old man fainted on the street in an employment bureau." Yet I see in our Patriot and other papers, that Canada is just now very prosperous. Having obtained two or three record harvests, and great activity prevailing in our mines, the Patriot's reports should be true. But the prospect of the Tax or Revenue tariff, with Government by Mr. McKenzie King seems to have had a bad effect upon Montreal, in view of the facts as set forth in the press. Industry is not flourishing there. The capital by which industry is maintained seems to be idle.

**THE MAIL ORDER BUSINESS**


Sir,—The letter signed "Farmer's Boy" appears to have been in the opinion of its writer of so much consequence as to call for its publication in the two Charlottetown Daily newspapers.

It makes no attempt at answering the case made out for the imposition of a tax on the mail order business of retail mail order houses. There is a surfeit of words out of argument. There is also apparent a complete misapprehension in the part of the writer of the subject he undertakes to deal with. No one has advocated, no one desires to shut out the mail order houses from doing business here, all that was intended, all that was asked for was that a reasonable tax should be placed on the business done through the mail. No one or a moment supposed such a tax could have any substantial effect in cutting out the business. Nor is it likely that it would materially affect the price of the goods sold. So "Farmer's Boy" need not lose so much sleep over the idea that all the tax will fall on the buyers' shoulders.

If the mail order houses refuse to establish themselves here where their goods are like other sellers can be appraised and taxed by the Provincial and Municipal authorities.
