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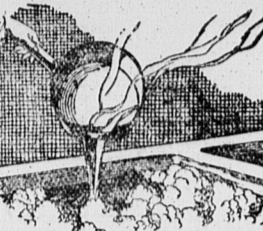

The address was read by Roadmaster J. J. Bethune and the presentation made by Fred Power of the Roadmaster's office.

Mr. Matheson just completed forty-four years in the employ of the C. N. R., and is one of the most popular men in the service. Entering the employ of the Road at Emerald forty-four years ago on the section by his conscientious work he was soon promoted to section foreman at North Wiltshire. After a number of years here he was about eight years ago, promoted to the responsible position of Road Master. This appointment necessitated his removing to this city, with his family, and where he soon made many friends.

The following is the address: Mr. Malcolm Matheson, Roadmaster, C. N. R., Charlottetown.

Dear Sir: On your retirement, from active duties of railway, in which you have been so long engaged, and have been so closely associated with you in your official capacity, desire to give expression to the esteem in which you are held, not only by us but by every employee with whom you have come in contact.
