Yesterday morning's thermometer was 6 above zero, bright sunshine, and last night the official reading was 6 above. The lowest recorded at the meteorological station at the Experimental Farm was 1 above yesterday.

U.L. Lodge At Kingston Holds Banquet

The annual banquet of King William L. O. L. No. 1166 was held in the hall at Kingston on the evening of January 21st. The hall was decorated in an artistic and patriotic manner and the emblems of patriotism were the outward signs of the instincts and aims of the noble order. The chairman of the committee of management, Mr. Daniel T. Fraser in his address made reference to the fact that the members of the Lodge had deliberated some time about having the supper this year in connection with the programme of the annual event on account of the conditions which prevailed as a consequence of the war. After due consideration it was felt by the majority that it could not be any cause for criticism or any ground for reasonable objection if the members brought their evening meal to the hall and invited a few friends to partake with them instead of eating at home. Then again the experience of the past had demonstrated the value of the catering as a means of bringing the people together in this social way and increasing that unity which is more than ever necessary now.

TEN KILLED AND 50 INJURED BY A HUN TRAIN WRECK

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 30.—An express train while running between Berlin and Munich, Bavaria, caught fire at Schleissheim, six miles of Munich, as the result of an explosion of a boiler of a locomotive, says the Saturday edition of Vossische Zeitung of Berlin. Ten persons were killed and fifty were injured.

"FOOD HOGS" GET NO MERCY IN BRITISH POLICE COURTS

LONDON, Jan. 30.—"Food Hogs" get little mercy in England. Messrs. Preston and Hewlings, Limited, butchers, of High-street, Kingsland, were fined \$250 at the London police court for exceeding the maximum price by charging the purchaser of a joint for 3 lbs. 2 ozs. when the actual weight was 2 lbs. 9 ozs. The assistant who sold the joint was fined \$25. At the same court three milk carriers were fined \$25 for supplying short measure. Walter Gambrell, of Marlborough-road, Holloway, the employer of one of them, was fined \$75. Thomas Davis, dairyman, of Willesden-avenue, was fined \$50 and costs for selling as butter a mixture containing 81 per cent. of margarine. Catherine Morgan, of Blythe-road, Hammersmith, was fined \$75 for selling margarine at 36 cents per pound instead of the maximum price of 25 cents.

Cabinet Considering Food Situation

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 30.—The war cabinet was in session all day Saturday considering the food situation, as disclosed in information recently received from Great Britain. Mr. Thompson, the new food controller, and Sir Charles Gordon, chairman of the British mission at Washington, were present at the deliberations. It is evident from advices received here that the food situation is becoming increasingly urgent in Great Britain, France and Italy, and that Canada and the United States must not only greatly increase production but in certain important lines eliminate all waste and possibly control consumption in order to help meet the situation.

It is known that Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of agriculture, since his arrival in Ottawa, has been working on plans for a far-reaching and important campaign for increased production this year. It was in connection with this plan that Mr. Crerar recently consulted the representatives of provincial agricultural departments, in order to secure their support and cooperation. The minister has since consulted with other leaders of agriculture in connection with the matter. It is understood that the food controller is giving special attention to the question of limiting the use of certain essential articles of consumption.

The manufacture of standard flour will be commenced by Canadian milling companies tomorrow. The available of a larger part of the wheat berry for human consumption and the stopping of the manufacture of patent flour will mean a considerable saving of wheat for export to the allied nations.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Barney Dolan, an agent for the Indian Harbor Belt Railroad and an assistant named Maloney, were shot and killed in a fight with freight car thieves in Franklin Park, a suburb, last night. The two railway men surprised a party of thieves at work and the fight followed.

Bolsheviki and Ukrainians Fight

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 30.—Heavy fighting has been in progress for several days between Ukrainian and Bolsheviki troops according to press despatches reaching here from Ukrainian sources. An attack was made by Ukrainian troops who attempted to take possession of Lusk, Volhynia. The Bolsheviki commander appealed for assistance to Austro-Hungarian commander of the district who declined to aid him.

WOULD GIVE DOMINIONS A PREFERENCE

LONDON, Jan. 30.—At the annual meeting of Barclay's Bank, the chairman advocated the maintenance of a fixed rate of exchange within the Empire, which would give the Dominions substantial preference, promote trade and economize in the use of gold. The balance of trade could be adjusted by the close administration of inter-imperial finance.
