CHAPTER 7. We found, as the days went by, that the early start determined up on each night for the following morning was more and more difficult to accomplish.

We were not going to visit Poperinghe again so we bid farewell to our kind friends the Vandermeersch, and the dear old church with its guardian spire and started off. The blocks of cement and our suitcases, loaded to their full capacity, had a steady effect upon the springs of the lorry and we were very comfortable.

The knowledge that we could do as we pleased gave us a great sense of freedom and we longed to get to the other parts of the life where fresh memories might be awakened. Our objective was the town of Bethune which we hoped to reach that evening, but between us and Bethune lay many a place which was rich in associations.

We felt quite sad as we passed for the last time over the roads which had once again become so familiar. Skirting the base of Mont-des-Cats, once more we passed through Caestre and Fletre and Bailleur. From Bailleur we turned to the south and made our way to Estaires. The place suffered very heavily during the last year of the war, and I do not suppose there is any trace left of the Town Hall, where we had held a service on Good Friday in 1915.
