S'IDE MOVES TO PROVIDE GARBAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM

The first move has been made in the direction of setting up a proper garbage disposal system in Summerside and the prohibiting of dumping along the waterfront, a practice that has been disgusting that part of Town for a long time. It was learned last evening from Councillor H.B. Schurman, chairman of the town property committee, that the town has purchased six acres of land from Mr. Charles McInnis at the west of town which will be used as a town dumping ground.

This land which is located on the Seaweed Road near the rifle range is out of sight from any highway approaching town. Mr. Schurman said that it is the intention to build two brick incinerators similar to the type used at the Mount Pleasant Airport for the disposal of waste that can be burned. Other refuse will be buried periodically with a bulldozer. The road to this dumping ground will be widened and gravelled so that it can be easily reached.

A man will be provided to keep the area in proper condition. Councillor Schurman indicated that after this dumping ground is in use consideration may be given to the setting up of a regular garbage disposal system by the Town. It is also understood that the council will now pass a by-law prohibiting people from dumping refuse in any other place than in the area provided for this purpose. - S.
