NEW SENATORS TO BE APPOINTED

Before Parliament Resumes, Who May Be The Lucky Public Men

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—(Special)—Before the House meets as is expected, the New Brunswick Senatorships vacated by the deaths of Senators Work and Dyer will be filled.

Hon. A. H. Coman of Digby will be one of the new Senators of Nova Scotia.

The two Ontario vacancies will probably be filled by the appointment of Hon. G. W. Ross and Robert Beith, ex M. P. from Bowmanville.

John Costigan and David Gillmor who were defeated by Ganoune in Charlotte County last election are mentioned as probable New Brunswick appointments to the Senate.

METHODIST INDIA MISSIONS JUBILEE

The Fund in India Amounted to \$96,000—In America \$192,000.

BARILLY, British India, January 2.—This was the last day of the Methodist Jubilee celebration which began here 23. October 1904. The afternoon was devoted to young people's rally and in the evening a meeting of the Epworth League was held having been preceded by a procession of 1600 members with banners and accompanied by music. A consecration service concluded the congress. The jubilee fund collected in India amounted to \$96,000 and that in America \$292,000.

FATAL FIRE IN MONTREAL ONE KILLED SIX INJURED

Worst Fire of the Season, Causes Loss of Half Million on St. Antoine and St. James Streets West —Names of Sufferers.

MONTREAL, Jan. 3.—(Special)—The worst fire of the season occurred this morning on St. Antoine and St. James Streets west, causing a loss close to half a million dollars, the death of one man and injury of a half a dozen firemen.

This was caused by the collapse of one of the brick walls. Hiermidis Gagnon, carter, was the victim. He was caught under the falling walls. The injured firemen were working on the ladder in the same locality when the brick came down.

FRANCE AND GREAT BRITAIN

Progress of New Campaign of Friendship—Presents State of Affairs

PARIS, Jan. 3.—The Associated Press has obtained some interesting information regarding the progress of Anglo-French relations which led to the recent erroneous reports that the entente of 1901 had been supplemented by a military or naval convention.

The 'entente cordiale' adjusting outstanding differences had no sooner been signed than the campaign of friendship was inaugurated.

All kinds of visits were exchanged, furnishing occasions for celebrating the new found friendship, and now a great Anglo-French exhibition in London has been planned for 1908.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Speaking at Cork tonight, after the unopposed re-election of Daniel D. Sheehan as a member of the House of Commons for Mid-Cork, William O'Brien, Nationalist, threatened revelations of the financial methods of the "Redmondites," which, he said, would be of greater national interest than anything that had occurred in Ireland since the Parnell commission.

Mr. Sheehan resigned his seat because being a follower of Mr. O'Brien, the party stopped his allowance, but the "Redmondites" did not attempt to fight his re-election and, therefore, according to Mr. O'Brien, the legal procedure afloat will result in the threatened revelations.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Baroness Burdett Coutts, the famous capitalist and philanthropist, who has been ill at her residence here since Christmas Eve, died on Dec. 30.

The death of the Baroness at the ripe age of 92 years, besides depriving the country of one of its greatest and most famous philanthropists, removes from London a unique personality and an interesting social figure.

Her life was a link with the past, for she was born during the reign of the Emperor Napoleon, and she lived during the reign of five British sovereigns, inheriting an immense fortune, she so used it as to die beloved by the whole nation.

It is stated that her fortune will go to her nephew, Francis Money Coutts, under the will of the late Duchess of St Albans, second wife of the Baroness's grandfather. Mr. Money Coutts becomes automatically a partner in the banking firm of Coutts & Co. It is stated that Lady Burdett-Coutts's fortune will not amount to more than £5,000,000.

There are three associations in the mind of every one with the name of the Baroness Burdett-Coutts. They are—vast riches, philanthropic enterprises, a romantic marriage.

Twenty-five years ago an immense stir was aroused in social circles by the announcement of the engagement of the Baroness Burdett-Coutts—a woman of 67—to Mr. William A. Hemad-Bartlette, an American gentleman, naturalized in England, and long the Baroness's confidential adviser, friend and man of business, but considerably her junior.

Owing to enormous wealth, which she used in forwarding and directing innumerable philanthropic schemes, the Baroness was one of the best-known and most beloved women in England. The Queen had raised her to the peerage in 1871 and in 1872 she had been admitted to the freedom of the city of London.

"Here," said the Chamberlain, in his address on the occasion, "is the first female name ever recorded in the lists of those whom the citizens have so delighted to honor."

BIG FIRE IN A COAL MINE

EDMONTON, ALBERTA, Jan. 3.—What is known here as the coal arch, eighty miles up the Saskatchewan river from Edmonton, is on fire and burning fiercely. This is the coal distil which the Canadian Pacific branch from Wetaskiwin westward was projected to tap. The seam, which in places is 20 feet thick, is burning for miles, giving off intense heat. Local parties interested are sending men up to look over the fire and determine whether or not the fire can be got under control.

DELEGATE WILL GO TO FRANCE Effort to Stem the Tide of Emigrants From St. Pierre-Miquelon

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 2.—Louis Legais, a fish merchant, who ran without opposition, was re-elected today as a delegate from St. Pierre Miquelon to the French superior council for the colonies.

He will make a special effort to induce the French ministry to take measures to arrest the depopulation of the Miquelon Islands, twenty per cent of which is estimated to have emigrated to Canada during the year.

ST. PETERSBURG PREFECT KILLED

By Assassin With Revolver and the Latter Slain on the Spot

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 3.—(Special)—Major General Von DerLantz prefect of police of St. Petersburg, was shot and killed by a young man at the Institute of Experimental Medicine this afternoon.

Von DerLantz was attending the consecration of the Institute chapel.

During the services there and while standing near several high officials, the prefect was approached from the rear by a young man who discharged a revolver and shot him in the base of the brain.

As the assassin turned to flee one of the officers present drew his saber cut out down the man and killed him.

The identity of the assassin has not been established.

RABBITS PREY OF DISEASE A Strange Malady

Mounted Police Captain Reports a Strange Malady to Have Broken Out Among Them In the Yukon

VAN COVEN, Jan. 2.—News of a strange malady which was broken out among the wild rabbits of the North was brought to the city by Capt. J. Fitz-Horrihan, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police who was until recently in command at Carcross. Y. T. Capt. Fitz-Horrihan came down from the North on the steamer Amurand went over to Victoria.

"The wild rabbits that are usually so plentiful in the North are being almost exterminated this season by some strange affliction that is carrying them off in large numbers," said Capt. Fitz-Horrihan. "Of course every seven years the rabbits become very scarce through some sickness that seems to kill them off by thousands, but this season around Carcross hundreds have been found dead, that upon examination were found to be afflicted with large tumors which were growing on their bodies. Every one up North is at a loss to account for the strange growth, which bids fair to totally exterminate these animals which have been a valuable source of food in the North.

"A veritable big game sportsman's paradise in the best terms that I can think of to describe the country around Carcross. It is as easy matter to get half a dozen moose, mountain sheep or goat at any time, within ten miles around Carcross. At the Mounted Police post we were never in want for fresh meat, either bear or moose. In the way of small game it is as plentiful that shooting becomes monotonous in a short time.

"About a fuel supply! Well in my opinion there is no need for alarm about the coal supply in the North. At Skagway there is a shortage, but I believe it could be relieved in a certain extent from the new coal mines at Five Fingers. The Yukon steamer have been using the coal from Five Fingers, and have found it to burn well. Around White Horse they have plenty of wood, so there will be no scarcity of fuel there."

WORST STORM IN 30 YEARS

Has Been Reging Practically All Through Great Britain and Europe

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The continuing snowfall has created a situation the worst known in thirty years in Great Britain and the conditions existing here apparently are general throughout Europe. From all parts of Great Britain come stories of trains buried in snow drifts, the worst one being that of a passenger train bound from Dundee to Edinburgh, which ran into a snow drift three miles from St. Andrews, and is still imbedded. A relief train sent to its assistance stuck in the drift, and all the efforts during the night to reach them were futile. A small quantity of provisions was conveyed to the hungry passengers and crews. The equipment of the British railroads is quite inadequate to deal with the conditions, heretofore almost unknown in this country.

800 SHOOK HANDS WITH LORD GREY

Hon. G. E. Foster Gone to Buffalo, To Address The Canadian Club.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—The governor general held a levee today in the east block and shook hands with about eight hundred persons.

The weather is unusually mild for an Ottawa winter though the sleighing is still good.

Hon. George E. Foster returned from Toronto today and left at once for New York and Buffalo. He is to address the Canadian Club of the latter city this week.
