APPRECIATION OF MR. CHESTER MCCLURE

What He Did for the Fox Business of P. E. Island and the Obstacles He Met and Overcame.

The last copy of the Black Fox Magazine has the following appreciative article on "What Mr. Chester McClure has done for the fox industry of P. E. Island," the sentiments in which will be concurred in not only by the fox men of the Province but by all who know Mr. McClure: "Probably every fox rancher on P. E. Island is familiar with the fact that Mr. Chester McClure, of Charlottetown is manager of the Sales Board of the P. E. Island Fox Breeders Association, and in a general way, knows that it was due to his efforts during the past two seasons that Island silver fox pelts brought as good prices as they did but what they are not familiar with, is the numerous obstacles that Mr. McClure has had to meet and overcome in order to make a success of the work he has undertaken.

"More than any one thing in connection with this undertaking, has been his desire to establish the fact that P. E. Island silver fox is the highest grade of fox known, and to place the Island rancher in a position to command the very highest prices for the fur he raises.

"The greatest obstacle with which he has had to contend is lack of co-operation on the part of some of the ranchers on the Island. It is not so much the fact that these ranchers may not wish to sell their fox pelts through the Sales Board that interferes with his efforts (as there are many good dealers to whom they can ship and receive good prices), as it is the fact that these ranchers believe they can do what it has taken him three years to accomplish: That is, place their own pelts on the market by personally visiting the larger cities and offering them for sale.

"This peddling of skins by individuals is the one thing that tends to depreciate the price more than anything else, and it should cease. Co-operation in selling the silver fox from Island ranches is all important, and the logical source through which this selling should be done is through the Sales Board.

"Another serious condition that Mr. McClure has to a great degree overcome, is the educating of the rancher regarding the placing of only pelts that are in good condition on the market. In past seasons many of the ranchers placed in his hands for sale, pelts that were not prime, still they expected him to obtain for them top prices.

"Mr. McClure has done a great work, and we believe that in this and future seasons he will accomplish much more, but the Island ranchers must not expect him to work impossibilities. The fox industry is now established on a commercial basis, and P. E. Island is known far and wide as the home of the silver black fox. Therefore, the Islanders should in every way, in their power seek to retain this place in the markets of the world, and in no way can this be accomplished better than solidly standing behind Mr. McClure and in every way possible assist him in the great work that he is doing for the P. E. Island fox industry."
