### AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE

The Commonwealth of Australia came into existence at a time when the martial spirit of the people had been aroused by war in South Africa, and the sending of a considerable force to assist the Mother Country. It is partly on this account, no doubt, that the federal defence bill now before the Australian Parliament is framed on so comprehensive a scale. From the abstract which has reached us it would appear that European systems have been taken for a model and the Commonwealth is so preparing that in an emergency she could place nearly a million men under arms.

In other words the bill provides that in case of war all inhabitants between the ages of 18 and 60, whose British subjects, and who have been resident in the Colony for six months are liable for compulsory military service. There are a few exceptions, of course, such as members of parliament, judges and ministers of religion, but it is estimated that under this law 970,000 men will be available for service. The bill also provides that when Britain is at war the right to volunteer to serve anywhere in her armies is given to the members of the Australian service. Severe penalties are provided for any one found sketching, photographing or trespassing on forts, or places reserved for military purposes.

It is to be observed that Australia has been for a good while the foremost Colony in regard to bearing a share in the defence of the Empire. The squadron of the Royal Navy located in Australian waters differs from any other of the eleven squadrons located around the world in that a number of its ships bear distinctly Australian names, and the Commonwealth contributes considerably to their maintenance. It is easy to see why the Australians should be interested in the Imperial navy, because of their insular position and the great extent of their commerce. It is not so easy to see why they should prepare to place a million men under arms. No hostile power could ever place 100,000 men on Australian shores, even if Britain should lose control of the sea. In fact no other country in the world is so naturally secured against possible invasion in force as is Australia. But the people there in their superabundant loyalty are bound to make assurance doubly sure.

Bradstreet's report of business failures in Canada during the year ended 30th, June last shows that there were 717 failures; assets \$2,850,566; liabilities \$3,412,518. In the previous year there were 678 failures; assets \$2,064,184; liabilities, \$5,173,318. The slight increase is mainly in the Maritime Provinces. Nova Scotia shows 53 failures as compared with 20 in the previous year. New Brunswick had 36 failures as compared with nine in the previous year. P. E. Island is charged with 6 failures; assets \$31,000; liabilities \$37,000; compared with one failure for \$2,800 with assets for \$400 in the previous year.

### INSURANCE RATES ON KING EDWARD'S LIFE.

LONDON, July 24.—The insurance on the king's coronation has commended, especially by Lloyd's. The present rate of premium is nine guineas per £100 on the king's life until the end of the coronation, but if the whole festivities, processions, etc. are to be insured against any possible mishap the charge is 30 guineas per £100.

### THE MAYOR'S DUTY.

His Worship the Mayor holds the power to dismiss from the office of Chairman of the Police Committee the convicted runner who now disgraces that position. Will the Mayor do his duty? The honor and credit of the City are confided to his keeping. Will it for a moment be argued that it is consistent, we will not say with respectability, but with ordinary decency that our police force shall be longer controlled and ordered by a man whom the same police have been compelled to hunt down as a law-breaker? Convicted by the police court and chased with a commitment, and yet head of the Police Committee! Think of it, honest, law-abiding citizens! Terminate the disgrace, Mr. Mayor, and end it quickly.

Once before a civic official was convicted of violation of law, when another Mayor was in office. To the credit of the Mayor of that time he took prompt notice of the new conditions and of the disgrace that had arisen. He held a firm hand, and did his duty. Let it be admitted that if McDonald were now dismissed from the Police Committee the Council would have the power to re-appoint him. They would not dare to do it! But and if they would so dare it would in no way affect the present, plain, unavoidable duty of the Mayor. Honor and decency demand that His Worship shall act. All that is reputable in our citizenship will endorse and uphold a prompt dismissal.

A recent writer on New South Africa claims for that country enormous mineral wealth. The gold in the Rand, he claims when got out will be worth some 14 billion dollars, and he estimated that it can be mined at a profit of \$4,800,000,000. These are almost fabulous figures. And then there is the coal of the Heidelberg and Middleburg districts which the same writer estimates at a total of 61,000,000,000 tons of "good" coal, after eliminating "inferior" coal from a still more colossal grand total. We need not mention diamonds in this connection although it happens to be a fact that some 93 per cent. of the world's production of these precious stones also comes from South Africa.
