S. P. C. A. Notes

Inspector MacLean reports this week: 4 dogs (old and ill) humanely destroyed. 14 dogs treated for the disease which is so prevalent, and which has not been definitely diagnosed as yet.

15 cats humanely destroyed — cats all suffering from a disorder somewhat similar to that from which dogs are suffering. A great many dogs are suffering from the disease. Inspector MacLean asks those who have kittens to be destroyed, to have it done when they are very young, so soon as possible after they are born. It is almost too much to expect any one, especially one who loves animals as Inspector MacLean does to do away with cute little playthings in cold blood.

In some cases the excuse is "The children like to play with them when they are small!" and there are still people who tell us there is no cure in the Prince Edward Island. How can people who love their children, have so little tenderness in their hearts for little helpless animals? It must be that they have not stopped to consider the matter in its true light.

Inspector MacLean made several trips to the country this week and found some cases of animals been kept in conditions, and being treated in such a manner, as to be almost unbelievable in a civilized country. These cases will be reported later.

"Precious" the tiny rat terrier belonging to Tom White, proprietor of White's Restaurant, has fallen a victim of the epidemic amongst dogs of her home province. Precious is in an effort to save the little dog's life, but veterinary treatment and loving care failed to save him. He was buried in an especially made casket in the rear of the restaurant, where his altercations with cats have been so frequently heard over the air, his barking reached the ears of the S.P.C.A. through the open window. Precious is mourned not only by the family to whom he belonged, but will be missed by members of the staff of C. G. C. Some of whom attended his burial with feelings of genuine sorrow.

In Memoriam

MRS. JOHN F. SMITH

On May 12, 1938, there passed peacefully away at her home, 51 Bayfield street, Charlottetown, Mrs. John F. Smith (nee Edith Roberts, of Middleton), at the age of 69 years. Although in failing health for some time suffering from the effects of two paralytic strokes, the late Mrs. Smith's death was sudden and came as a shock to her family and many friends. The late Mrs. Smith resided in Charlottetown for the past three years, but had lived the greater part of her life in the village of Kinkora, in which community she was held in the highest esteem and respect by her many friends and neighbors. Possessing a kind and cheerful disposition, she endeavored to do all in her power to bring her acquaintance. Her never-failing charity, especially to the sick and afflicted, and the hospitalities of her home merited for her a wide circle of friends who will ever cherish her memory. The deceased bore her prolonged illness with resignation and Christian fortitude, accepting all things as coming from the hand of God. She was a devout member of St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, for which parish she worked with untiring zeal while health permitted her.

Besides her sorrowing husband, there are left to mourn the loss of an exemplary Christian wife and mother one son, William, of Kinkora, and two daughters, Mary and Ada, of Charlottetown. Three brothers, William, Henry and Ezekiel Roberts, of Kinkora, also survive.
