## U. S. Potato Crop Estimate Is Increased

The October estimate for the United States potato crop is 13,000,000 bushels more than the estimate for the month of September according to a report received by Mr. J. W. Boulter, Secretary of the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers Association. The estimate for the month is 452,000,000 bushels, as compared with about 350,000,000 bushels for the same month of 1929.

# PROPOSAL OF EMPIRE TRADE ADOPTED BY STANLEY BALDWIN

## Conservative Party Of Great Britain Approves Of Premier Bennett's Plan— Will Be Major Issue In Next General Election—Ministry Urged To Accept Canada's Proposals.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Premier Bennett's proposal of Empire trade preference has been adopted by the Conservative Party of Great Britain, and if any early general election is held the problem will undoubtedly be a major issue.

In a manifesto last night, Right Hon. Stanley Baldwin wholeheartedly endorsed the plan and declared it would be the standard under which the Conservatives would fight.

# BOYD AND CONNOR SUCCEED IN TRANS ATLANTIC FLIGHT

## Tried And True Columbia Nego- tiates The Stormy North At- lantic—Plane Lands On One Of The Scilly Islands On The Southwest Coast Of England— Congratulations Cabled Flyers.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 10.—When informed of the safe arrival of Captain Erroll Boyd and Lieut. Harry P. Connor at Treago, Sir George Perley, acting Prime Minister, despatched a cablegram of congratulations on behalf of the Government and people of Canada. Sir George's cablegram, addressed to Captain Boyd was as follows:

"On behalf of the Government and people of Canada we heartily congratulate you on being the first Canadians to fly across the Atlantic and rejoice to hear of your safe arrival."

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 10.—Indications that Parliament at its next session would have before it the task of reconstructing the financial setup of the Canadian National Railway, were suggested at the hearing before the Board of Railway Commissioners today. Giving evidence in justification of the increase in freight rates on newsprint, E. R. Mallory, director of the Bureau of Statistics of the C. N. R. gave as his estimate of the physical valuation of the railway properties the sum of one and a half billion dollars. He would not like to say how this compared with the cash investment, he told Commissioner Thomas Vien, K. C., in view of the situation contemplated with respect to the reorganization of the financial structure that was shortly to come before Parliament.
