Halifax Cripple With Sportsman's Heart Dies At 24

HALIFAX, Dec. 9.—(CP)—Little Joseph Al-Molky, 24 year old Lebanese boy with a sportsman's heart but the shrunken limbs of a paraplegic, died suddenly in his sleep today.

Joe's chief ambition—to see Toronto Maple Leafs in action—was fulfilled last October when the Leafs' manager, Connie Smythe, invited him and his family to Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens to see big time hockey for the first time in his life.

Another aim, which he hoped to achieve next spring was to enter the baseball-playing arena in the city's juvenile league with himself as manager.

Disase left Joe a helpless cripple shortly after his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Al-Molky, brought him to Halifax from Lebanon 22 years ago.

Although he was unable to play with the kids who used the slopes of Citadel Hill or the open spaces of the Halifax common near his home for diamonds, he attended every ball game, pulled in a little red and yellow express cart by some neighborhood friend.

A familiar sight at all senior baseball and hockey games, Joe also never missed a Saturday night broadcast of the National Hockey League games.

When the Canadian Paraplegics Association heard of his love for sports they interested manager Smythe in him.

When Smythe made plans to invite paralyzed war veterans and civilians from all over Canada to games at the Maple Leaf Gardens, Joe was asked to attend the Oct. 26 game.

That night he sat in one of the best seats in the house and later was taken to the Leafs' dressing room to meet the stars of big league hockey. He also met Foster Hewitt, the sports announcer who had brought the games to him through his radio.

When Joe came home he called it "the biggest night of my life."

"Dropped Ball" Whets Interest In Davis Cup Play

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 9.—(CP Cable)—Burning interest in the forthcoming Davis Cup play between Australia and the United States has been aroused here by the "dropped ball" tempest involving the Australian tennis star John Bromwich.

It started when Gardnar Mulloy, member of the United States squad now warming up at Melbourne for the Davis Cup games at the end of the month, questioned Bromwich's custom of dropping his second ball at his feet after a successful service with his first. The ball then bounced to the other end of the court to distract his opponents.

Mulloy, playing unsuccessful doubles with Billy Talbot against Bromwich and Colin Long in the Victoria State finals, asked the Australian if he couldn't keep his spare ball out of sight. Bromwich approached the umpire for a ruling and was told that there was nothing in the book to make him change his habit.

Newspapers took up the case and for three days it was a front-page story. No official action has been taken on the case because no formal protest has been launched by the Americans though their manager and the Australian manager talked the matter over.

The Australians are worried that if Bromwich is asked officially to change his style of getting rid of his spare ball it might affect his game which is the linchpin of the Australian's Davis Cup hopes.

They say that because Bromwich is a two-handed player he can't hold the ball while play is going on the way single-handed players do. They think that the alternative of having him put it in his pocket also might throw him off his game.

Medynski And McManus In Scoring Race

HALIFAX, Dec. 9.—(CP)—With Vic Jackson, United Services walking leftwinger, out of the goal net with the demise of his team, the Maritime Big Four scoring race has settled down to a nip-and-tuck battle between Lou Medynski of Truro Bearcats and Sammy McManus of Moncton Hawks.

Figures compiled today by the Canadian Press show the slim, blond Truro rightwinger has 30 points — 10 goals and 20 assists — two more than Moncton's 36-year-old persider. McManus' total is made up of the same number of goals and 11 assists.

The same two are tied for the most number of goals scored, and Bucko Trainor of Moncton leads the assisters with 16.

Until yesterday, when Services bowed out of the League, Jackson was tied with McManus and Services Jackie Spideil was in third place with 21 points. Jackson, Spideil and Bus O'Grady had netted 33 of their team's total of 59 goals.

Their exit leaves Billy MacIntyre of Truro and Mouse Dowling of Moncton deadlocked in No. 3 position with 23 points each. Bearcats' Knik McDonald is fourth with 21, and Hawks' Trainor fifth with 21.
