AMHERST, N. S., May 27 - (CP) - The Maritime Regional Employment Committee of the Unemployment Insurance Commission today endorsed a resolution calling upon the Federal Government to give immediate consideration to a plan combining health and unemployment insurance.

Under this scheme a worker not eligible for insurance benefits because of illness or other causes would be legally entitled to receive equal financial compensation and protection either by direct benefits or by a refund of contributions paid into unemployment insurance.

The meeting decided that when the national committee visits the Maritimes later this year the Maritime committee will request that their main meeting be held at Sydney, N. S., with Halifax as alternative.

J. R. MacDonald of Glace Bay, N. S., told the body that the community of Passchendale would be a "ghost-town" in three years or less and 400 men thrown out of work due to the imminent closing of the mill industry.

which was also approved and adopted. During the meeting, H. R. Doane and Company were appointed official auditors for the coming year.

Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, who was present was called upon and addressed the meeting briefly. He complimented the hospital staff and volunteer workers on having done such a marvelous job in the past year, and spoke on the policy of his Department as it concerns hospitals. Mr. Matheson also offered his fullest personal support and co-operation.

Arrangements have been made for co-insurance coverage of all our buildings and equipment. This insurance has been fairly and equitably placed among the various insurance agencies in the City.

Our equipment has been kept up-to-date and extensive repairs made to the roof of the main Hospital. New equipment such as a resuscitator and other materials have been provided as required.

Dr. Lea has kindly consented to accept the position of Supervisor of the Laboratory. This will do much to improve the efficiency of that Department.

Mr. Ingham Palmer has been acting as Office and Credit Manager for some months now. With our increased bed capacity and greatly increased operative costs this is a very essential position.

The Hospital Wing is operating to capacity and your Board has received very many compliments on the efficient manner in which this wing is being carried on.

During the year 5911 patients were admitted and 5899 patients discharged. The total number of in-patients was 54,037 or an average stay of 8.5 days per patient.

The average number of adult patients per day was 148. The largest number of patients in any one day was 208 on February 18th, and the highest monthly average 187 in the month of March.

Our Hospital services were provided as follows: Medical - 1189, surgical - 842, obstetric - 619, gynecological - 206, eye, ear, nose and throat - 256, urology - 118, children's cases - 311, radiographic and fluoroscopic examinations made - 7254, X-ray treatment - 94, Veterans' patients days - approximately 13000.

This year with the 200 bed capacity available for the full year we will show a great increase in the number of patients.

During the year Dr. J. K. L. Lewis and Dr. Temple Hooper have been added to our Medical Board.

Miss Mary Lowther, R.N., who was our very capable and painstaking Supervisor of the Maternity Department resigned during the year to take on, we hope less onerous duties. The position was filled by the appointment of Miss Vivienne McRae, R.N., who is rendering very efficient service.

Many changes have also taken place in our floor and kitchen staffs. Together with the problem of ever increasing wage demands has occupied considerable time of your Board.

We regret the loss of another of our staunch supporters of our Hospital during the year - the late Mr. S. A. MacLeod. Mr. MacLeod served many years on the Board and was a member of the Building Committee of the Main Hospital, the Veterans' Annex and the Training School. Mr. MacLeod has left a lasting monument to his memory in the part which he played in the building and equipping of the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

We are glad to welcome back to our midst Dr. George F. Dewar, a member of our Medical Board. We trust that he may have many years of enjoyment on our Medical Board and in treating the corridors of the Hospital he served so faithfully and well.

Man Arrested For Molesting Woman

City Police last night took into custody a man and held him on a complaint of molesting a woman. He is scheduled to appear in court this morning.

British Naval Base The bicentenary of the ordering of the first uniform for officers of the Royal Navy is noted in the press of Great Britain, says the New York Times. It appears that before 1748 officers dressed as they chose, styles and colors in each ship depending on the captain's taste. A meeting of the Navy Club, at a coffee house in London, proposed a uniform for officers, and the rule in contemporary navies, and in due course the matter came before the King.

Senior officers were invited to send in their ideas of patterns and colors, competition being very keen to get each one adopted. As the national colors at that time were red and blue, it seemed desirable that these would be chosen. But blue and white also had strong support, and George II finally picked them after seeing the Duchess of Bedford in a riding habit of those colors. The order for the first naval uniform followed from the Admiralty in April, 1748.

British Try To Grow Own Tobacco LONDON, May 26 - (Reuters) - British smokers, faced with cigarette scarcity and unprecedented high duties on tobacco, are flouting a widespread belief that tobacco will not grow in Britain. Many Britons actually have planted sturdy tobacco crops in their back gardens.

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Invite MacArthur To Return Home

WASHINGTON, May 27 - (AP) - A Senate committee today invited General Douglas MacArthur to come home from Japan to help with defence plans. The 17 to 2 vote by the appropriations committee does not make the return of the 67-year-old supreme commander of the Allied forces in the Far East mandatory.

But Senator Styles Bridges (Rep-N.H.) said he believed the army now would order MacArthur back home and said that in the past "every request made by the committee has been so honored."

MacArthur has not been back in the United States since before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941.

Greater Production Would Cut Prices

OTTAWA, May 27 - (CP) - Graham Towers, governor of the Bank of Canada, today held out little hope that the prices committee that anything but greater production could reduce prices.

"The essence of the thing is the catching up of production," he said when he appeared as a witness in the committee's probe into the rising cost of living.

He declined to predict how much longer the cost-of-living index would continue to rise and said he knew of no way of bringing down prices by voluntary action.

An attempt to reduce prices through a system of controls would involve "infinite difficulties," he said and the system would have to be more rigorous than in wartime when patriotism and the existence of controls in the United States contributed to its success.

Bank Statement

OTTAWA, May 27 - (CP) - Dominion Government deposits increased \$13,000,000 to \$125,990,000 in the week ended May 26, the Bank of Canada reported today in its weekly statement. Notes in circulation increased \$700,000 to \$1,193,225,000 while deposits by chartered banks decreased \$1,120,000 to \$532,509,000.

Shortage Of Men In United Church Ministry

HAMILTON, May 27 - (CP) - The United Church of Canada will be 800 men short in the ministry by 1954, the Rev. Dr. W.H. Young, secretary of the committee on colleges and secondary schools, told this morning's meeting of the Hamilton conference of the United Church at McMaster University.
