THE City of Ghent experienced some rough weather on her last trip to this port. She left Port Hawkesbury at about four o'clock Thursday morning and when off Pictou Island the storm was so bad that the captain was obliged to turn her back as far as Cape George where she was anchored until 2 o'clock on Saturday morning, and arrived in Charlottetown at 1 p. m. She brought the largest freight to this port carried by her this season.

Temporary repairs have been made to Corran-ban Bridge for the accommodation of the public until the general repairs, which will be sold by auction shortly, are made. His health had been failing for the past two years, but he was wonderfully active for a man of his age. On the day of his death he had walked about his farm as usual. In the evening as he was walking out from the house, he fell and expired almost immediately. He was a kind and obliging neighbor and a man of large-hearted hospitality. His house was a home for ministers of the gospel. A member of the St. Andrew's church, his place was never vacant on the Sabbath, rain or shine, until ill-health compelled him to remain at home. His many friends will long remember his genial smile and cheerful encouraging words. Much sympathy is felt for the widow and family in their sudden and sad bereavement.

THE following particulars of the sad death of Mr. Alwin Laird, son of the late Hon. Alexander Laird of Bedeque, are clipped from the Vancouver World of the 26th inst.:—It is not often that a death occurs at Epworth, and for that reason alone the community of that burg between Vancouver and New Westminster, feel an additional sadness at the sudden demise of their popular postmaster, Alwin Laird. He was a young man and was coming into the city on Wednesday evening to attend one of the Thanksgiving functions, and being in a hurry to catch the car at the Cedar Cottage station, ran a part of the way from his house. The over-exertion brought on palpitation of the heart and he expired almost immediately after falling in the path. Mr. Laird was a nephew of the Hon. David Laird, of Prince Edward Island. He was a brother-in-law of H. C. Shaw, barrister of this city. Among residents of the district in which he lived he was much respected and every one in the neighborhood has a deep feeling of sympathy for his sorrowing relatives. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon from Center and Hanna's undertaking parlors.

THE following is a clipping from the Montreal Herald. The Mr. McDonald mentioned is a native of P. E. Island and well known by many. It has now been definitely arranged that the McDonald chemistry and mining building in connection with McGill University will be formally opened by His Excellency the Governor-General on Dec. 20th. The date of the opening has been fixed on this date to meet the convenience of Lord Stratheona, the chancellor of the university, who will occupy the chair on the occasion. The opening function will take place in the afternoon in the handsome lecture theatre, but as this room is capable of accommodating only some 300 persons, the number of invitations issued for the function is necessarily limited. In the evening there will be a grand reception given by the university authorities, and for this purpose some of the other buildings, as well as the School for Applied Science, will be thrown open. A large number of citizens will have the opportunity of attending the evening function, and of seeing and appreciating the splendid building presented to the university by Mr. McDonald. This department of the university is now in a fairly complete state as regards equipment, but some of the apparatus we have yet to come to hand. The classes in the mining and chemistry branches are well attended, and since the commencement of the present session research work has been carried on by members of the staff and by the students. The greater part of the very fine collection of reference books presented by Mr. McDonald are already arranged upon the shelves of the library, and students will soon be able to avail themselves of the advantages of an equipment which will be unrivalled by any educational institution in the world.

At Cardigan on Wednesday, Nov. 30th, Mr. Donald Stewart, aged 78 years.

Suddenly at Perth Amboy, New Jersey, on the 28th ult., Donald Ramsay, formerly of Summerside, P. E. Island, in his 70th year.

At Cardigan Bridge, on the 30th ult., Donald Stewart, leaving two sons and two daughters. The deceased was over eighty years of age and for many years a prominent resident of Cardigan, where he was engaged in farming, ship-building and trading. He was a Justice of the Peace, and held other positions of public trust. He was highly respected and esteemed by all who knew him.

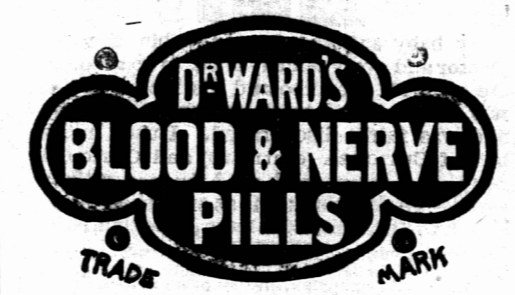
