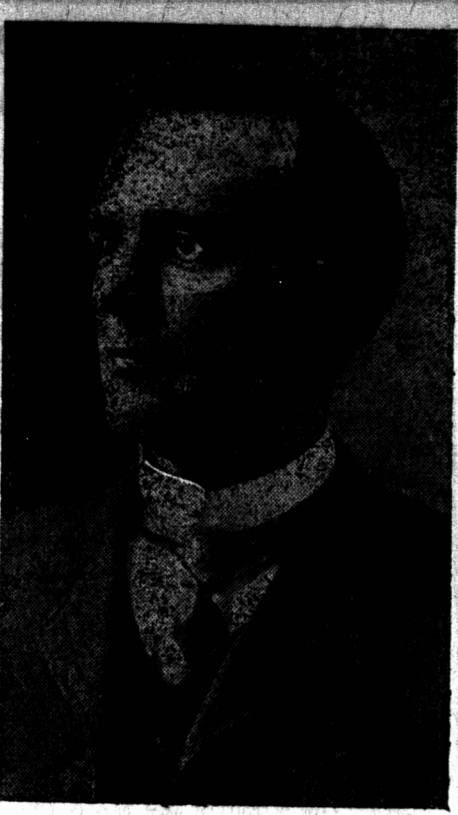

Dr. MONTZAMBERT, Health Officer of the Dominion of Canada, is on an official visit to the quarantine station in Cape Breton. To a Post reporter last evening he stated that the public health of Canada was good. While there were 35,000 cases of Small Pox reported in the United States, there were practically very few cases in the Dominion. To guard of this disease, the Department was maintaining an army of health officers along the frontier and had put extra men on in a good many of the provincial ports. The duty of the Department was to prevent diseases from being brought in from a foreign port; but once inside they came under the jurisdiction of the provincial or municipal authorities. They had nothing to do with the Douro case, neither could they permit the patient to be placed in the quarantine hospital because the disease was not brought in from a foreign port. The type of the disease now prevalent in Canada was a mild one, and has paralyzed all efforts of the boards of health to stamp out. The work of installing a steam disinfecting plant is now going on at the quarantine station at Point Edward in recognition, as Dr. Montzambert said, of the growing importance of the town of Sydney.—Sydney Post.



STIPENDIARY McQUARRIE, S'SIDE.

Nell McQuarrie, K. C. of the law firm of McLeod, Morson & McQuarrie, and the subject of this sketch first studied law in the office of Hodgson & McQuarrie, Charlottetown, and was admitted an Attorney of the Supreme Court in October, 1883, and one year later was admitted to the bar of the Province. In 1885 upon the resignation of the late James W. Howe he was appointed Stipendiary Magistrate of the Town of Summerside, which position he holds at present.

YESTERDAY afternoon after returning from Georgetown, the Minister of Railways accompanied by the other railway officials and members of parliament viewed the proposed sites for the Charlottetown station. It is understood that three locations are being considered. One is where the present round house stands, another at the foot of Great George street and another on North side of Water Street in block opposite present railway property. It is pointed out that to remove the round house an immense amount of money will have to be expended and if the station is built there it will not be in the best part of the city. The Minister also visited the bridge site and works.

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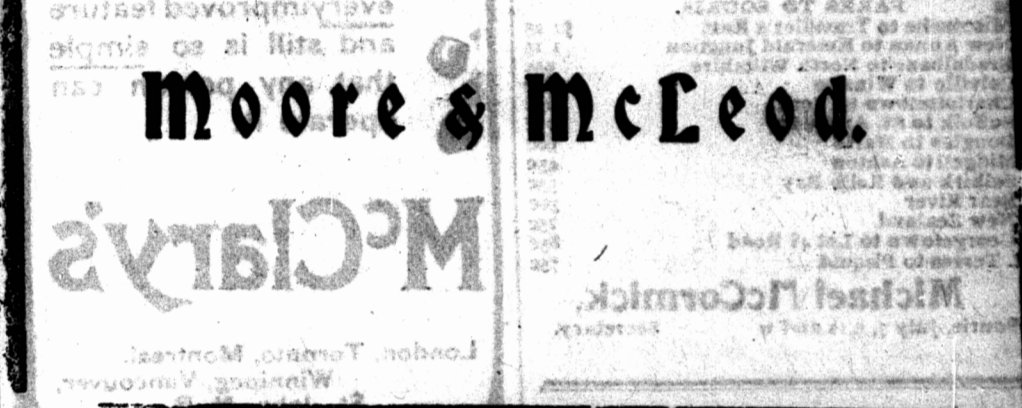

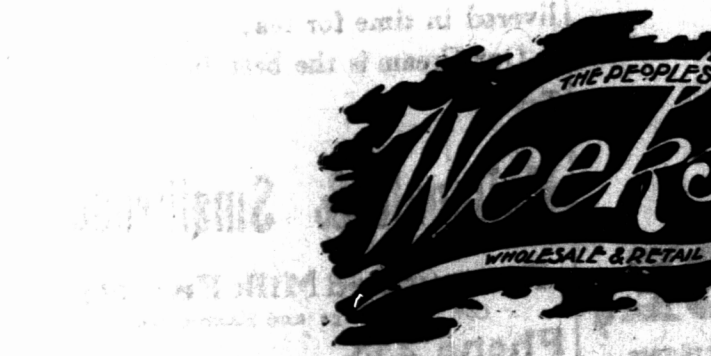
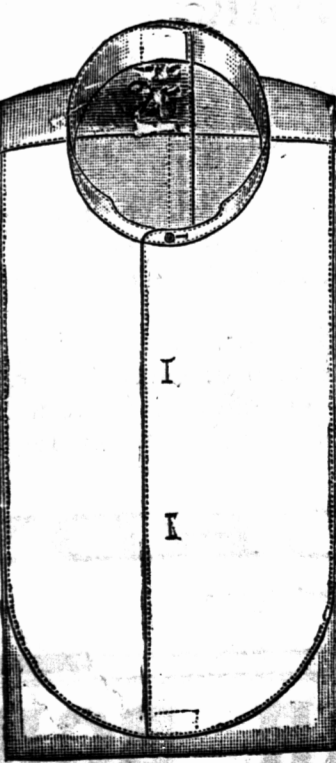
